

ALLIES WIDEN BREACH

(United Press Leased Wire.) WITH THE FRENCH ARMIES ON THE SOMME, Oct. 4.—The allies have now widened their breach in the German lines on the Somme front over a 45 fathom front (about 25 miles) to a maximum depth of 15 kilometers (about eight and one half miles). In the early days of the offensive, the allied attacks were delivered on a front extending from a point north of the Albert-Bapaume highway to a point north of Chaulnes. The capture last week of Thiepval extended the British attack almost to the Ancre brook. The French reached south of Chaulnes and captured the village of Villy. A heavy rainthatched operations for two days ceased falling yesterday noon and artillery began tuning up, particularly south of the river.

REPORT VILLA IN BATTLE

(United Press Leased Wire.) EL PASO, Tex., Oct. 4.—The arrival early today in Juarez of two wounded officers from the Casas Grandes garrison lent color to the reports that the Carranzistas garrison at the latter town and a small body of Villa bandits had clashed near there. Cases Grandes is located on the communication lines of Pershing's expedition. Many residents of Juarez stayed on the American side of the border last night, fearing an attack on the town. Current rumors had set the date for an attack by Villistas as October 4. The last report to the military authorities at Juarez placed the bandit leader in the Guerrero district west of Chihuahua City, where Villa is reported encamped and recruiting his forces.

Taft and Theodore Roosevelt had met—shaken hands—and spoken. The Union League club was the spot. No mere reporters were permitted to desecrate the scene—but— No "Dear Will" Staff. Roosevelt and Taft did shake hands. They both asked, "How'd you do," but neither answered the question. There was no one who heard "Dear Will" or "Dear Theodore" staff. The two merely nodded. Taft stuck his hand out. Roosevelt grabbed it, gave it one up-and-down pump and dropped it. Then the two, with Chauncey M. Depew standing between them, stood in line while all the big republicans in New York city came

along to shake hands with two former presidents and a would-be president. Who Did It a Secret. As to just who got the colonel and Judge Taft together, there is difference of opinion. Some say Gov. Whitman hooked his arm through the colonel's, led him over to Taft, and said: "Mr. Taft, here's Col. Roosevelt." Some say George R. Sheldon did the deed. Others said they were cordial. COUNTY BUDGET SMALLER BY \$4,621

NEW JAPANESE PREMIER STRONG FOR EXPANSION

(United Press Leased Wire.) TOKYO, Oct. 4.—Field Marshal Terauchi has been appointed prime minister, succeeding Marquis Okuma, who resigned yesterday. The new premier holds the highest rank in the Japanese army and until his appointment today was governor general of Korea. Terauchi, a fighting man, was

strongly supported by Japanese leaders following a strong military policy. He has been described by writers as the champion of an aggressive expansion policy, particularly with reference to China. One Japanese newspaper declared recently that if Terauchi ever succeeded Okuma as prime minister it would not be long before a Japanese army would be on the road to Peking.

(United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Oct. 4.—While the pangs of milk hunger began to hurt on the east side today, Mayor Mitchell as mediator tried to stop the up-state milk strike. He had a proposal from the Dairyman's league—the producers—to deal with the Big Three distributors without league recognition but with the demanded increases in prices under a six months' contract. Meantime, the milk supply dwindled rapidly, though some additional came from new and distant sources. On the east side, where

high prices and shortage is first felt, it was a common sight today to see little children with buckets grasped in emaciated hands, begging in delicatessen and milk stores for "just a little milk so that baby wouldn't suffer." The dealers had nothing to give. Farther up-town in the quick lunches, they too, were short of milk. That was the situation all over town. The distributors still looked after hospitals and families with children but the portion at each home was either seriously diminished or entirely eliminated.

Are the Germans Using Millions of 'Mad Empress'?

(Newspaper Enterprise Association) BY MARY BOYLE O'REILLY. LONDON, Oct. 4.—Is Germany building her fleet of under-sea freighters of the Deutschland type with the money of her imperial highness Carlotta, "the mad empress of tragedy"? This question has been raised since announcement by Dr. Ceyse, a Hollander, that the "Empress" Carlotta, under German protection in the guarded chateau of Tervueren, near Brussels, had so far regained her reason that she is "now able to make testamentary disposition of her fortune as she wishes."



Carlotta, called the "Mad Empress."

The significant part of the announcement is that if Carlotta dies while denuded her ten million dollars go to the daughters of Leopold I, and the children of King Albert, but if she is now sane the emperors of Germany and Austria may be selected as her heirs. Since Brussels was taken by the Germans in August, 1914, her imperial majesty's person and property have been under protection of the German forces. Carlotta had been officially reported hopelessly insane, since 1870, when she was placed in the chateau under the guardianship of her brother, King Leopold II. Was Belgian Princess. The "Empress" Carlotta was born a princess of Belgium in 1846. At 17 she accepted the Archduke Maximilian, whom she had seen only twice. When the easy-going archduke accepted the imperial throne of Mexico, offered by Napoleon III, Carlotta was content. Maximilian, supported by French troops,

BERLIN ANNOUNCES 27 FISHBOATS SUNK

(United Press Leased Wire.) BERLIN, via wireless to Sayville, Oct. 4.—From September 20 to September 29, German submarines operating in the North sea and English channel, sank in addition to those previously reported, eleven English fishing steamers and four Belgian sea lighters and 35 other hostile boats, including 27 fishing steamers with a total tonnage of 14,600. Thirty-one prisoners were brought in.
