New York For Wilson

(Special to The Times.)
NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—The Empire state with its 45 electoral votes may be counted surely for President Wilson. Never at this stage of a national campaign have indications of democratic success in New York state been so positive. In a conference today with National Chairman McCormick, Edwin S. Harris, chairman of New York state democratic committee, went carefully into detail of the state campaign and later summarized his reports as follows:
"President Wilson will carry New York by more than one hundred thousand. This estimate is based on a canvass made by the democratic state committee which showed that the president has a united and militant democratic party behind him, together with the support of a large number of republicans. The democratic party in New York is harmonious and for the re-election of President Wilson to a man."

Hammer Disgusts Him

NEW YORK, Oct. 6.—David L. Fultz, lawyer and former Brown university football star, has resigned from the executive committee of the Hughes National College league because of unjust attacks made upon President Wilson by the republican party.
Mr. Fultz called the National Woodrow Wilson College Men's league on the telephone today and said he was ready to do all in his power to aid in the election of Wilson. As a result, Mr. Fultz is now a member of the executive committee of the Wilson college Men's league.

Probe Soldier's Death

WOODLAND, Cal., Oct. 6.—Relatives of Charles Call, California militiaman, declared today they expected to ask the war department at Washington to investigate Call's death while serving with the California guardsmen on the border.
The quest is based on the receipt of a letter from a fellow militiaman stating that Call's body, riddled with bullets, was found hanging from a tree on the Mexican side of the border. News of the death was received yesterday.

Six Firemen Killed

ST. LOUIS, Mo., Oct. 6.—With ten bodies found, officials today were satisfied there would be no larger toll from the fire which yesterday destroyed the historic Christian Brothers college. Two rigid investigations were on today to rest the blame for sending a squad of firemen into the ruins but a few hours after the fire was under control.
Six firemen were killed and eight injured, two perhaps fatally, when a wall collapsed.

Rumanians Driven Out

(United Press Leased Wire.)
SOFIA, Oct. 6.—Not a single Rumanian soldier of the 15,000 who crossed the Danube and were encircled and cut to pieces by the Bulgars now remains on Bulgarian soil, it was officially announced today.
In Macedonia Bulgarian troops have repulsed British attacks against Nevolet.

Nominees All Stick

The official count of votes cast in the recent primaries was announced by the canvassing board Thursday night. As nearly all the contests in the primaries were between republicans, the vote showed that most citizens had asked for republican ballots, and there was little to indicate the real division of strength between the parties. There was no material change in the standing of the candidates as previously published.
