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COOMBS IS WINNER OF THE THIRD

United Press Correspondent. **EBBETS' FIELD, Brooklyn, Oct. 10.**—The Dodgers did it. After being beaten in two straight games by a one-run margin they returned the compliment to the Red Sox this afternoon and took the third game of the world's series by a score of 4 to 3.

The Dodgers kept their feet from start to finish. There was not a single bobble in the infield or outfield. For six innings Veteran Jack Coombs pitched sterling ball for Brooklyn and though he was relieved by Pfeffer in the seventh, credit for the victory goes to Colby Jack.

Behind his pitching and that of Pfeffer in the last two innings the Dodgers put over their victory by straight, out and out clouting, mixed with a carefully played sacrifice and clean fielding on the defensive.

11 DESTROYERS MAKING SEARCH

EUROPE ENVIES U. S., DECLARES MAN WHO KNOWS

I have been on every front in Europe and in every capital except Petrograd. On the fronts I have seen the horrors of war. And in the capitals I have seen the efforts of the various fighting nations to draw the United States into the war.

In war, thinking men become unthinkable beasts. Men of business, science and achievement stop their work and become mere physical units in an army. Youths drop their life dreams and their futures. Ambitions crumble. Home and family plans are swept aside.

Progress, whose figure we carve in marble to decorate our proud buildings, becomes a withered, paralyzed wreck. The blight of hate reaches into the innermost corner of every city, of every home, of every heart. WORSE THINGS THAN DEATH FALL TO THE LOT OF MILLIONS OF HUMAN BEINGS IN WAR, including mental and moral decay.

Into the situation which would produce these terrible changes I have seen all the nations of Europe endeavor to drag the United States.

Watched Europe Try to Tangle Us

From those capitals, at the other end of the line, I have watched Washington and the government there extricate the United States from one plot after another, from one diabolical machination after another.

Sometimes we in Europe, who were seeing the European side of the picture—the efforts of the allies to draw us into

HONOR.
We were always able to look the other fellow in the eye and be proud. No one over there ever seriously charged us with loss of honor, and men are highly sensitive to such things over there.
We were proud of American sanity and of American statesmanship and that cool, calm reckoning of the American people who prevented them from being stampeded.

It was a fine, thrilling thing to be an America in European capitals and to KNOW THAT IN OUR OWN CAPITAL AT WASHINGTON THERE WERE MEN AS SHREWD AND AS FAR SIGHTED AS ANY OF THE STATESMEN OF EUROPE; to know, also, that the statesmen in Washington were steeper, saner, less influenced by hate and bitterness and better able to judge right and wrong, than the wisest statesmen in Europe.

(EDITOR'S NOTE.—W. G. Shepherd, who writes the accompanying striking article, has probably seen more of the European war than any other American. He had been in Mexico for two years reporting the revolutions when war was declared in Europe. Within three weeks he was on the French front. Later, he spent several months



For many months he was the only American correspondent with Gen. French at British headquarters in France.

He was in Serbia when the central powers drove the Serbian army out, and went with the army.

For many months he was with the allied armies at Salonika, going from there to London.

He wrote the first detailed story of a Zeppelin raid in London for American newspapers.

Shepherd returned to this country several months ago and went to the Mexican border.

This newspaper considers this article by Shepherd one of the most significant and important contributions to the literature of the presidential campaign.

It contains much food for thought by Americans who put the interests of their country ahead of partisan policies.)
