

GERARD, HOME, IS RETICENT

(United Press Leased Wire.)

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Returning from Berlin on board the steamer Frederick VIII, American Ambassador James W. Gerard today refused to answer any question relative to the purpose of his visit to America at this time, saying that even the simplest question "might involve" him.

"Is it true that you are bringing a peace message from the kaiser to President Wilson?" he was asked.

"I cannot answer that question," replied Gerard.

The ambassador's attention was called to an article wirelessly from the Frederick VIII to a New York paper declaring positively that he brought no peace message but came to warn President Wilson that Germany was preparing to resume indiscriminate submarine warfare.

Will Go Back.

"I cannot answer that," he replied. "I have given no interview since I left Berlin. You will note that in this article I am not quoted."

"It has been reported that you will not go back to Germany," one reporter told him.

"I am not sure when I will go back, but I certainly shall go back," was his reply.

Gerard said he first learned of the submarine activities on this side of the Atlantic Sunday night.

Given Great Welcome.

When the patrol boat, with Gerard, a party of his friends and a group of New York officials aboard, docked 30 automobiles, drawn up at the landing, by a pre-arranged signal let loose long blasts from their horns.

The din continued as the party sped up Broadway to the city hall, where Acting Mayor Dowling formally welcomed Ambassador Gerard.

The ambassador was visibly affected by the tributes paid him. He spoke briefly, his eyes filling with tears as he finished.

"Mr. Straus, Mr. Acting Mayor and gentlemen," said he, "on behalf of both Mrs. Gerard, who has so nobly stood by me during the last two years in Germany, and myself, I want to thank you for this reception. There is no recognition like the reception of the city where a man has passed his life, and no city can give a more splendid recognition than the great city of New York."

\$1,000,000 TRADE BID

NEW YORK, Oct. 10.—Strangled to death with the strap she used to carry her school books, 11-year-old Bella Bricker was found in the basement of a tenement building at 184 Monroe street today. The little girl had been missing since she started for school yesterday morning. She evidently was attacked on her way to school. Her clothing was badly torn and her face bruised and covered with blood. Morris Silverstein, the janitor, who discovered the body, said he was in the cellar at 10 o'clock last night and saw nothing unusual. Detectives believe the girl was assaulted and killed at some other place and her body dragged to the tenement building last night.

WON'T LIKE U. S. STAND

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 10.—Acting Secretary of State Polk today said the United States' answer to the memorandum recently sent by the allied powers to all neutral governments concerning the admission of belligerent submarines to neutral ports does not in the least acquiesce in the allies' view. He declined to discuss the United States' position further. The allies in their memorandum made public in London yesterday declared neutral nations should refuse belligerent submarines the right to enter.

RUMANIANS IN RETREAT BEFORE TEUTON DRIVE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
BERLIN, via wireless to Sayville, L. I., Oct. 10.—Rumanian reinforcements, rushed up in an effort to block the Austro-German drive through Transylvania, were halted and defeated southeast of Marlenburg, said an Austrian official statement received here today. The recapture of Kronstadt, principal city of Transylvania, was preceded by violent street fighting, the Vienna statement revealed. The Rumanians everywhere are in retreat. The army of General von Arz encountered only local resistance in entering the Harneiter and Goergny mountains. Capture of a Rumanian island in the Danube near Slatov was effected by an Austrian flotilla, assisted by German and Austrian detachments. Three officers, 155 men and six cannon were captured. The Austrian war office announced the repulse of all Rumanian and Italian attacks.

BELIEVE BOY MURDERED

OAKLAND, Cal., Oct. 10.—A state-wide search for a gypsy band encamped here a short time ago was instituted today, following the finding of the body of Rudolph Masquedo, six years old, in San Leandro bay. The boy was last seen alive Saturday afternoon riding in a buggy with a dark skinned man and immediately after the gypsy camp was unsuccessfully searched it is not known whether the lad was murdered or drowned accidentally but the murder theory is generally accepted. The boy's mother, in a precarious condition from worry over the disappearance, has not been told of his tragic end. His father, Panfilo Masquedo, knows no motive for murder unless gypsies, seizing the boy for ransom, decided to do away with him when they found Masquedo is not wealthy.

CAR DROPS OVER BANK

As the result of a broken steering rod, the big touring car of James H. Hutchinson, engineer of the Dupont Powder company, plunged over the bank of the new convict-built road along Hood canal, last Friday, and dropped 75 feet to the beach. Hutchinson and Oscar Zurdana, his assistant, were badly injured, but miraculously escaped with their lives. The two men were on a hunting trip to the Elwah country. Word of the accident reached Tacoma Monday night, when the injured men were returned to their homes.
