Burglar Returns Loot

Declaring that he was not a real thief and that he stole because he was out of a job and half starved, the burglar who entered the home of F. H. Scobey, 208 North Yakima avenue, Saturday night has returned to Scobey \$4,000 in bonds he took. The burglar's conscience would not let him accept the \$300 reward advertised in The Times by Scobey for the return of the bonds, but finally accepted \$75 which Scobey pressed upon him. In answer to his advertisement, Scobey received a telephone call from the burglar Tuesday at his cigar store on Pacific avenue and arranged to meet him.
