### U-BOAT CAMPAIGN ON THIS SIDE INTOLERABLE

(United Press Leased Wire.) ON BOARD PRESIDENT WILSON'S TRAIN, COLUMBUS, O., Oct. 12.—President Wilson passed through here early today en route to Indianapolis, where a busy program awaits him. Before leaving the summer white house the president disposed of all immediate questions arising out of the spectacular appearance and activity of the German submarine U-53 off the eastern coast. It is learned careful inquiry will be made by this government through regular diplomatic channels to ascertain whether Germany intends to continue on this side of the Atlantic such raids as

were inaugurated by the U-53 just outside American ports. Such continued action would be regarded as intolerable by this government, it may be stated on good authority. The president also appointed the advisory commission to be associated with the council of defense for working out plans of rapid mobilization of the country's resources. The commission included Daniel Willard, Baltimore; Samuel Gompers, Washington; Dr. Franklin H. Martin, Chicago; Howard E. Coffin, Detroit; Bernard Baruch, New York city; Dr. Hollis Godfrey, Philadelphia, and Joseph Rosenwald, Chicago.

## PROBING FRAUDS ON U. S.

(United Press Leased Wire.) WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 12.—Seeking to head off what they believe is developing into one of the greatest financial frauds the United States has known, the federal farm loan board today asked the aid of the department of justice. Clear across the continent in a strip of states from Virginia to California, the board reported to the justice department, organizations either deliberately fraudulent or at best illegal, have sprung up for the purpose of defrauding farmers through the latter's ignorance of the new rural credits act. In one single instance, it is said the farmers have been victimized to an aggregate of \$350,000. Governors of states and members have been made unwilling parties to some of these illegal operations, it is said, the promoters taking advantage of them as well as of the farmers. Prominent men in all walks of life have been involved, their names being used in some cases simply to lend respectability. The board believes it will be able to prosecute successfully.

### TO SWITCH M'GREGOR

H. J. McGregor, who has occupied the position of street and bridge superintendent ever since Commissioner Hamilton F. Gronen took office, will probably be appointed superintendent of the Tacoma water system when the council switch takes effect next week. Gronen announced Thursday that McGregor would be a valuable man at the head of the plant, because of his previous experience in that work. Paul Savidge, who has been water superintendent since Drake took office, is slated for removal. "I believe that the light and water department is over-run with superintendents and unnecessary officials," said Gronen Thursday. "I will begin weeding them out just as soon as I have determined where cuts can be made to the greatest advantage."

ORDINANCE NO. 6468.—AN ORDINANCE providing for the improvement of Washington Street, Union Avenue, North 25th, North 26th and North 27th Streets, creating Local Improvement District No. 972; providing for a special fund for the payment of the cost of said improvement by special assessment upon property within said district benefited thereby; providing for the issuance of local improvement bonds, and declaring an emergency. WHEREAS, an initial resolution adopted by the Council of the City of Tacoma, Sept. 12, 1916, declaring the intention of said Council to make the improvement hereinafter described and fixing Monday, Oct. 2nd, 1916, as the time for hearing objections to the making of said improvement was duly published in accordance with law; and WHEREAS, prior to the 2nd day of October, 1916, the Commissioner of Public Works of said City submitted to said Council the estimated cost of said improvement in the sum of \$4,044.40; and a statement of the proportionate amount thereof which should be borne by the property within the proposed assessment district, in the sum of \$4,044.40; and a statement of the aggregate assessed value of the real estate, exclusive of improvements, within said district, according to the valuation last placed upon it for the purpose of general taxation, in the sum of \$30,840.00; and a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts or parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited by said improvement and the estimated amount of the cost and expense of the improvement to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land within said district; and WHEREAS, on said 2nd day of October, 1916, all remonstrances against the making of said improvement were overruled by the Council; NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY OF TACOMA: Section 1. That Washington Street between North 24th and North 35th Streets, Union Avenue between North 31st and North 37th Streets, North 35th and North 36th Streets between Adams Street and Union Avenue and North 37th Street between Adams and Washington Streets, be improved by laying cement concrete sidewalks five (5) feet in width, according to the plans and specifications prepared therefor by the City Engineer, now on file in the office of the Commissioner of Public Works. Section 2. That the real property to be benefited by said improvement and which is hereby created Local Improvement District No. 972, is described as follows:

All the lots in Blocks 1, 2 and 4, Lots 4 to 10 inclusive in Block 3, Lots 1 to 3 and 9 to 12 inclusive in Block 8. Lots 1 to 3 and 9 to 12 inclusive in Block 7. Map of Law's Addition to Tacoma City. All the lots in Blocks 101, 102 and 201. Lots 1 to 6 inclusive in Block 202, The Park & Boulevard Addition to Tacoma, W. T. All of said property being in the City of Tacoma, Pierce County, Washington. Section 3. An assessment is hereby levied upon the several lots, tracts and parcels of land in said Local Improvement District for the purpose of defraying the cost of said improvement. In accordance with the law of the State of Washington and Ordinance No. 4811 of said City. Said assessment so levied upon said lots, tracts and parcels of land respectively, may be paid either in cash, without interest, before the issuance of bonds, or in five equal annual installments, together with interest on the unpaid balance so charged at six per cent per annum; and each year after the issuance of the bonds hereinafter provided for one of such installments, together with the interest due thereon and interest on the unpaid balance, to become due in the manner provided by law and the Charter and ordinances of the City of Tacoma for the collection of assessments for local improvements. Section 4. A special fund is hereby created to be called Local Improvement Fund, District No. 972, which shall include the aggregate of the several amounts assessed, levied and collected upon the several lots and parcels of land in said local improvement district for the purpose of defraying the cost and expense of said improvement. Out of said fund shall be paid the bonds, interest thereon, and the entire cost of said improvement, and the entire cost of said improvement shall become the property of the City of Tacoma, but shall be treated as a special fund which shall be used for the purpose herein indicated. Section 5. The Commissioner of Public Works is hereby ordered to proceed with said improvement by letting a contract for the construction of the same, after inviting bids therefor in the manner provided by the City Charter, and make out and certify to the Council an assessment roll, charging the cost and expense of said improvement against said lots, tracts and parcels of land in said local improvement district. In calling for bids the Commissioner of Public Works shall state that the contractor doing the work shall agree to accept at par the bonds issued in pursuance of this ordinance in payment of the same, and shall have no claim whatever on account thereof against the City of Tacoma except solely upon said bonds, the special assessment made and the fund hereby created. Section 6. Under the provisions of Chapter 38 of the Laws of the State of Washington of 1911, and this ordinance, there shall be issued five-year annual installment local improvement bonds against said district amounting in the aggregate to a sum equal to the amount of said assessment remaining unpaid at the time of their issuance, but not in excess of the cost and expense of said improvement, which bonds shall bear interest at the rate of six per cent per annum from the date of their issuance, shall be numbered consecutively and be in denominations of \$100 each, except the first numbered bond, which may be for a less sum if necessary. Said bonds shall be issued and dated not less than thirty days after the expiration of the time when said assessment may be paid without interest, penalty or cost, as fixed by the City Treasurer's notice of the assessment roll being in his hands for collection.
