

IRVIN COBB SUPPORTS THE PRESIDENT DESCRIBES HUGHES AS 'A SAD FAILURE'

BY MILTON BRONNER. NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—(Staff Correspondence.)—"I'm for Woodrow Wilson because he is getting us ready for war and keeping us out of it."

This epigrammatic answer was made by the most popular and most widely read writer in America—Irvin S. Cobb. His reply came spontaneously.

There was no chance for a frame-up of a lot of bright things he was to say, because he did not know he was to be interviewed until he was caught on the fly in front of the theater, where his latest play, "Under Sentence," is being produced.

IS EASILY INTERVIEWED

Interviewing Cobb is a joy. He is the same Cobb, modest and friendly, with the same inexhaustible fund of stories that he was when working as a reporter in Louisville.

"Remember when we were kids back in Kentucky, working for 12 bones a week and no eight-hour day, either?" he questioned.

"Never mind ancient history. Why are you for Wilson?"

"Well—Roosevelt has been wrong on most subjects than any man of his time, but after I saw the hell that is war in Europe I came back home convinced of the profound truth of one thing Teddy said: 'Speak softly and carry a big stick!'"

SAW BELGIAN TRAGEDY

"I was in Belgium when that little country was invaded by the magnificently prepared German army."

"I saw towns in flames, women, children and old men fleeing, game little Belgian soldiers dying."

"All at once it occurred to me that our American dream that no one would ever attack us was false unless we were prepared to repel attack."

"So I came back home rampant for preparedness."

"I think I raised my feeble pipe for it before it became a propaganda. I began to preach big army, big navy, military training in colleges and schools."

A PIONEER IN IT

"I think I was about the first to take the present war as a text for preparedness."

"I sprung this on a cold, austere crowd of wealthy New Yorkers, and when THEY rose to it, I knew people with warmer blood would."

"After that I went on a lecture tour and whenever I talked about preparing our country, I got the kind of applause George Cohan got when he discovered the American flag was a grand old rag."

AS TO THE BIG STICK

"Now, as to this big stick business: The trouble with Teddy and Charles Evasion Hughes is that if they had control of the stick they would want to hit someone with it to see whether it would really break a skull."

"Judging by their speeches, they would want to try it on Germany and Mexico, either or both."

"I admire Wilson because he has the inclination to get us ready for serious eventualities and the splendid ability to keep us out of trouble."

"If there is one thing worse than not getting ready for war, it is getting us into one."

"Wilson may not be a 100 per cent candidate, like Hughes, but the plain people realize that he is a 100 per cent president."

HIS MISTAKES

"They say he has made mistakes. Maybe he has. He is only human, and very human. Maybe he did mistakenly trust some of those Mexicans, like Villa. If he was deceived, he fell into a common fault."

"The real progressive of this country made some mistakes, too. The most colossal one was believing that Roosevelt was acting politically on the level with them."

"But how about this crisis that Hughes and Teddy say is confronting the country?"

Cobb laughed.

'TIS AN OLD ALARM

"In every presidential campaign since Washington's day the orators have declared the country was on the verge of the greatest crisis since the republic was founded."

"You know that old crisis is tucked away in mothballs. Every four years we take it out and dust it off and yell about it. I don't believe the country is facing any such crisis as it did in the days when Abe Lincoln was at the helm."

"In fact, I think it highly probable that the republic may survive through the fall and winter if the republicans win, but it will be in safer hands if Wilson is kept in command."

COBB'S SCOOP

"No matter which party wins, I want to give you a scoop; the crisis will be put back in the campaign chest for another four years."

Then I put the question to Cobb:

"You have been abroad several times since the war started. A lot of people who have been in Europe have come back saying there never was a time when America was so little thought of as it has been because of Wilson's policies. In fact, they said they were ashamed of their country. How about it?"

ANSWER IS ANGRY

Cobb became very serious, as he said angrily:

"I know. A few prominent, near-prominent and almost-prominent people, together with a bunch of hope-to-be-prominent, have given that stuff to the newspapers. And it is false, every word of it."

"Any time I am ashamed — of my country — I'm not coming back," he said seriously and slowly.

"And that is what those snobs ought to do—stay away! If they are ashamed of their country, that makes it unanimous, because the country is certainly ashamed of them."

WILSON'S RECORD

"Wilson in the face of a divided public opinion, has kept reasonable peace within his own party, has kept national and international peace, has not engaged in vituperative argument."

"He may have coined a few phrases, but he did not emulate Teddy in calling everyone who disagreed with him a liar."

"Hughes is a sad failure. He fell out with his party organization in New York city, parted company with most of his old-time advisers and, I am told, is not speaking terms any more with his barber."

SPEECHES ARE FUTILE

"His speaking tours are giving satisfaction to everyone but the republicans. He started out by pointing to grave abuses in the national government, to great crimes of omission and commission by Wilson, and he wound up with the charge that a republican had been removed to make place for a democratic boss doctor."

"I suppose that is the crisis that caused him to doff the ermine of the justice for the motley of the piffing politician."

JUDGE HUSBAND'S HOUND

"Somehow, Hughes reminds me of the hunting hound old Judge Husband's grandfather imported to Paducah, Ky. It was the best dog ever bred down in North Carolina and brought to Kentucky. It had the stoutest heart and the most willing legs in the world. But it couldn't concentrate."

"That dog would start out before sun-up and track a deer. It would go swooping along, giving that animal a run for its money, and just when you would expect

the deer to be at bay, off would Mr. Dog, after a fox it just couldn't resist.

THAT DOG COULD RUN

"The fox is some runner, but that dog could run, too. And then just when the contest became in-

teresting, Mr. Dog would sniff a rabbit and make off after it.

"Result was, about sun-down you would see that hound, after a day's hard work, barking like thunder because it had a chip-monk treed!"

Shot Husband to Escape Embraces

(United Press Leased Wire.) NEWARK, N. J., Oct. 25.—Mrs. Marguerite Beutinger shot and killed her husband, Christopher, a wealthy coal man, to escape his welcome embraces, according to testimony given at the opening of the beautiful matron's trial for murder here today.

Mrs. Louise Graff, housekeeper for the Beutingers and her husband, Eugene, testifying for the prosecution, swore that after their reconciliation, following a divorce in 1914, Mrs. Beutinger and her husband occupied separate rooms.

"When I heard the shots and ran into her bedroom she told me she had entered her bedroom three or four times that night," Graff testified on cross-examination.

"She told him each time to get out, she said, but the last time he threatened to kill her."

Not Nervous.

"Did she tell you that he had tried to force her to submit to his embraces?" Graff was asked.

"Yes," he replied.

Beutinger displayed scarcely any trace of nervousness while a jury was being selected, and Assistant Prosecutor Wilbur was denouncing the shooting to the jurors as a premeditated murder.

Child Amused.

Little white-haired Billy Beutinger, dressed in a sailor suit, enjoyed the preliminary proceedings immensely and laughed while the assistant prosecutor was demanding his mother's conviction of murder.

But when the housekeeper, Mrs. Graff, was describing the tragedy in the bedroom, his eyes filled with tears and he sobbed audibly.
