## BOMB PUT IN SUBWAY

(United Press Leased Wire.) NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—An explosion which Inspector Egan of the bureau of combustibles declares was caused by a dynamite bomb, seriously damaged the interior of a subway station at Lexington avenue and 110th street today.

## GERMAN TROOPS SHIFTED

(United Press Leased Wire.) PARIS, Oct. 25.—German reinforcements are being rushed up to the Verdun front to meet the new French offensive, according to advices from the front today.

In response to the crown prince's appeal for help, the Teutons are shifting regiments back from the Somme to the Verdun.

General Nivelle's lightning stroke northwest of Verdun yesterday accomplished a two-fold purpose. It definitely removed the German menace to Verdun and it halted the massing of a huge German army on the Baugonne-Peronne line for a great counter-attack on the Somme.

## AIRMEN TO HUNT FIRE?

(United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 25.—Aeroplane patrols for locating forest fires are under serious discussion today by the Western Forestry and Conservation association, in session here.

The subject was introduced by E. M. Gott, member of the Northwest Aero club of Seattle, who read a paper written by President W. E. Boeing of that organization.

Improvement of the lumber business was the main order of the day, many expert papers on that topic being presented.

## TO PAROLE M'NAMARA?

(United Press Leased Wire.) SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25.—John J. McNamara, serving a 15-year sentence in San Quentin prison, will probably appear before the California state board of prison directors next Saturday to make a personal plea for release on parole.

This news was confirmed today by Warden Johnston of the prison following receipt by the San Francisco labor council of a request that the organization endorse McNamara's parole.

McNamara was one of two brothers convicted of the Los Angeles Times dynamiting.

## FLOUR UP 20 CENTS!

(United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., Oct. 25.—Flour jumped 20 cents today, reaching a record-breaking rate of \$8 a barrel for patent, the highest ever known here.

Further increases are imminent and the price of all breadstuffs will probably go up.

## JUST 'PURE INVENTION'

WASHINGTON, D. C., Oct. 25.—The Mexican embassy today officially branded as "pure invention" reports that General Carranza is preparing to withdraw as leader of the de facto government in Mexico and perhaps leave the country.

## C. P. STRIKE CALLED OFF

(United Press Leased Wire.) OTTAWA, Ont., Oct. 25.—Minister of Labor T. W. Crothers received a telegram at noon today announcing that all danger of the Canadian Pacific strike was averted, that an agreement between the Canadian Pacific and its employees would be signed in a few hours.

## TWO CENT RAISE

WINNIPEG, Man., Oct. 25.—Canadian Pacific railroad officials announced this afternoon that there will be no strike of trainmen at 5 o'clock this afternoon, as scheduled.

The men win a wage increase of two cents an hour.

The formal order calling off the strike was sent out this afternoon.
