"It makes no difference whom women vote for, as long as they vote against Wilson," said Miss Julia Hurlbut of New York at the Tacoma theater Wednesday evening. Miss Hurlbut spoke under the auspices of the National Woman's party. Mrs. W. P. Trowbridge, chairman for the 3rd congressional district, presided. Miss Hurlbut is an effective speaker, and at the close of her address answered a number of questions from the floor clearly and simply. She touched on no subject save the federal amendment for woman suffrage, declaring that to be the paramount issue before the country.

Foretells Sub Trips

A letter accurately foretelling the near sailing of the big German submarine Deutschland for the second voyage to the U. S. was received in Tacoma three weeks ago by Mrs. George A. Heagerty, 3011 North Union ave., it developed Thursday. It was sent by relatives. How it ever escaped British censors is unexplained. The letter declares that in a few weeks, about Dec. 10, the second of the great submarines, the Kaiser, would follow from Bremen. The submarine Bremen, it said, would sail about Jan. 10. Rumors of the loss of the Bremen the letter declared to be part of the scheme of German authorities to conceal the movements of their vessel.

Warns of Fem Bosses

(Special to The Times.) PUYALLUP, Nov. 2.—"Women have just as much bossism in their clubs and political work now as men had when the men were in the same stage of political development. You've got five or six women bosses in Tacoma today who are working to be bigger bosses. If you go back to the old convention system, you'll have the boss woman, just as we used to have the boss man." This was the retort of Fred Mead, republican, to Miss Margaret Upper, speaker for the Women's Hughes auxiliary, at a meeting of women at the Mead home Wednesday. Miss Upper advocated Referendum Measure No. 5, saying the presence of women in politics would purify the conventions and prevent old abuses.

Condemns 'Wet' Lies

(Special to The Times.) SEATTLE, Nov. 2.—Dean John T. Condon of the University of Washington law school today issued a statement denouncing the misuse of his name and that of President Suzzallo as members of the committee of 100 which is supporting the booze bills. Circulars bearing their names have been distributed by the "wets." "I shall vote against both Initiative Measures Nos. 18 and 24," says Condon, "and I believe I am expressing Dr. Suzzallo's sentiment also. The use of our names as members of this committee of 100 is entirely unwarranted."

From Jail to Funeral

John Pierwsza is being taken from the county jail to Wilkeson by a deputy sheriff Thursday afternoon to attend the funeral of his wife, found shot to death in their home Monday night. Held in jail pending an investigation of the shooting, Pierwsza made the request that he be allowed to attend the funeral. The prosecuting attorney's office is still puzzled over the case. Deputy Prosecutor Selden declares there is not sufficient evidence to definitely connect Pierwsza with the killing.

Transporation War

(Special to The Times.) SEATTLE, Nov. 2.—Collisions between Sound passenger boats which resulted in fines of \$26,000 being levied by U. S. Collector Drumshell against the Kingston Transportation Co. and Capt. John Fredenberg of the steamer Bremerton are part of a Sound transportation war, Secretary Philip D. MacBride of the K. T. Co. charged Wednesday. He said the collisions have grown out of efforts of the Puget Sound Navigation Co. boats to duplicate and beat schedules adopted by his company's boat to Bremerton.
