And keep them empty, rather than send back to the gutter the fallen brothers as they emerge. Let the following facts burn like fire into your heart and conscience:

W. R. JARRELL, assistant parole officer of the STATE REFORMATORY at Monroe, says:

"Prior to January 1, 1916, one of our greatest troubles with men on parole consisted of the inability on their part to save a percentage of their earnings.

"Since the adoption of initiative measure No. 3 this cause for failure of men on parole has been practically eliminated. For the purpose of getting this down to a basis of figures, I have taken a list of 100 men, men whom we considered our worst liquor problems. These men have been on parole for from three to eight months, and in 70 per cent of these cases these men have money in the bank or on hand. A number of these men had families, who previous to and during their incarceration were county charges. Since the removal of the ruse they are no longer objects of charity, the husband and father, though a paroled man, is full of pride in his family, happy and contented.

"Our five years' experience in parole work in the state of Washington forces us to give credit for this improved condition to the splendid working of our prohibition law. A return to the old way would mean the ruin of a very great many of these men and their homes. We have more than 300 men on parole and violations have materially decreased in comparison with former years."
