## For Lieutenant Governor

Louis F. Hart, lieutenant governor, is going about the state, ranting against the labor federation, the farmers' granges, and direct legislation advocates who were instrumental in putting the referendum on seven of the vicious measures passed by the last legislature.

He particularly is defending the bills which seek to cripple the initiative and referendum and direct primaries. He sheds a few crocodile tears for the good old convention days which he hopes will be restored under Referendum Bill No. 5.

Hart, as presiding officer of the senate, was considered quite a joke in Olympia.

Once, when Gov. Lister was away from the state for a week or so, Lieut. Gov. Hart proved himself a joke to the entire state. Taking advantage of Lister's absence, Hart named two members of the board of regents of a state institution. Hart presumed to make the appointments as temporary governor. There was no urgent need for the appointments. There was no emergency. It was just the act of a thorough egotist. The state laughed, the men whom Hart appointed refused to accept appointments from him, and Lister named his own men.

It is not unlikely that in a normally republican state such as Washington, Hart, republican, may be re-elected. That would be a misfortune, however, in view of the candidacy of Thomas Lally of Spokane, democrat, a clean-cut, progressive young man of proved ability.

Independent voters should give their preference to Lally for lieutenant governor. Vote against Hart just as you vote against the referendum measures.

The climax of campaign piffleousness was reached Thursday afternoon by a Tacoma partisan newspaper that is bitterly fighting President Wilson.

That paper had made the discovery that the workers in the Standard Oil plant on the tideflats had straw voted 9 for Hughes to 19 for Wilson.



Andrew Furuseth, President of the International Seamen's Union, in a telegram dated October 3, 1916, said:

"As Judge, George Turner refused to issue injunction, holding labor is not property. As legislator, he acted upon the same principle. He always placed men above property, and in these times, so dangerous to human freedom, he can be trusted absolutely."




