Testing for Flat Feet.

With the navy department's appeal for recruits to fill the need of more men, and President's Wilson's order increasing the enlisted strength of the navy to 87,000 men, as told in The Times Monday, young men have been asking what the requirements are for enlistment.

The following information on how to join Uncle Sam's navy was prepared for The Times by Chief Petty Officer G. Strickland, in charge of the navy recruiting station in Tacoma.

For service in Uncle Sam's navy, in contrast to the army, a recruit must have both eyes perfect. In the army, bad vision of the left eye would not disbar a man because he uses his right eye in sighting his rifle.

In the navy both eyes must be perfect, for a man on the deck of a warship must not be mistaken in what he sees miles off.

A navy recruit must also have perfect color perception. In reading signals at sea, a slight mistake of color may cause the loss of a \$15,000,000 battleship and thousands of lives.

Weight and chest expansion are governed by the height of a man. An applicant may not fill the required conditions as to these points, but if the examiner sees the man, otherwise is physically fit, he passes the man for enlistment.

Flat feet, abnormalities, diseases of the skin and internal organs, unsightly marks on the face or malformations of the body are other causes for rejection.

Between 16 and 17 an applicant must have the consent of the navy department at Washington, besides that of his parents, before being enlisted.

From 17 to 18, consent of the parents is necessary for enlistment, although parental consent is asked also for men under 21. Applicants up to 30 years of age are received in the navy unless they are not citizens, were dishonorably discharged from any service.



The Eyes Test.

In the United States, or were convicted of a felony.

Finger prints of each applicant are taken to guard against "repeaters," men dishonorably discharged who want to return into the service.

As soon as a man fulfills all requirements he is sent to the nearest naval training station to be prepared for the service before he is assigned to a ship.
