

AMERICANS IN ENGLAND PREPARING

(United Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, March 28.—America's rush of preparedness is not confined to the limits of the United States.

It is apparent here Americans resident in England, like their fellow citizens at home, are personally preparing.

A number of leading members of the American Chamber of Commerce, including H. W. Thornton, manager of the Great Eastern railway, representatives of the United States Shipping corporation, the General Electric and the Baldwin Locomotive works today formally offered their services to the United States government through Ambassador Lodge.

It was likewise learned today that members of the American embassy staff have been detached from routine work and for some time past have been busy obtaining information from British government departments regarding British methods of raising loans, the construction of roads and railroads, the manufacture of munitions, the internment of aliens, and all other measures possibly capable of adaptation to conditions in the United States in the event of an American-German war.

150,000 AWAITING SUMMONS

(United Press Leased Wire.)
NEW YORK, March 28.—An army of 150,000 men—the national guard of the United States, is on its toes awaiting the summons. They are fit and ready, from the buckles on the mules' harness and the straps on the "paw-paw" to the big six-inch howitzers in the artillery.

As a unit the national guard is better fitted for actual war service than at any time since the volunteers were mustered out after the Civil war, commanding officers of the different organizations assert.

"Our so-called 'second line of defense' is ready to jump into the first line. They are ready as they have never been before," said Gen. Albert J. Logan of the Pennsylvania National Guard today.

On the Mexican border General Logan commanded the second brigade of Pennsylvania infantry and saw 40,000 guardsmen from eleven other states being put through their training.

"In addition to the regulars, we now have a real army of more than 150,000 men ready at an instant's notice to spring forward for any sort of service.

"From the physical standpoint they could not be in better shape. Every man is hard and ready for a 100-mile hike under full pack. "While on the border the artillery perfected itself in marksmanship as they could not have done under any other conditions. The infantry upheld the tradition that Americans can shoot straight."

POWER PLANT STILL SAFE

Although a heavy rain Tuesday night further weakened the overhanging mountain of earth and rock that threatens to sweep down upon the municipal power plant at LaGrande, no additional slides were reported Wednesday.

Commissioner Groner and Electric Supt. Evans hurried to the power plant Wednesday morning to take personal charge of the work of rebuilding power transmission towers in the danger zone. Work will also be started on shoring away the endangering hill, as soon as the work can be safely carried out.

U. S. TO RUN RUBBER FIRM

AKRON, O., March 28.—The United States government will assume full control of the B. F. Goodrich Co. in event of war with Germany, it was announced today.

Government officials have been several days assisting in the taking of inventories and forming a naval reserve of 1,000 men among factory employees.

These men have been enlisted for four years' service in the factory at a maximum of 12 hours per day. They are to receive \$1 per day.

VON BRINCKEN TO ASK INTERNMENT

SAN FRANCISCO, March 28.—To escape the alternative of giving bonds which might be as high as \$200,000 or going to jail, Lieutenant Wilhelm von Brincken, convicted of violating American neutrality along with former German Consul General Franz Bopp, E. H. Van Scharck and others, is planning to ask that he be interned at Angel Island in case of war between the United States and Germany.

WOMEN TO DECIDE SUFFRAGE ISSUE

DES MOINES, Ia., March 28.—A referendum vote by women exclusively on the equal suffrage question is possible for Iowa. The state senate today, without a word of debate and by a vote of 34 to 7, passed a joint resolution for such a referendum at the regular state election in 1918.
