RUSSIA'S IN A NEW TURMOIL

(Continued From Page One.)
Threatens Russia's future in the war is shown by the fact that after listing a long series of the provisional government's acts to which the soldiers and workmen object, the council representing these elements formally declared they would not approve of any loans to Russia until fully informed of the complete war aims of the entente and of all details of the compact entered into by the czar and his ministers.

The council, in disingenuous of the tenacity of the situation.

At the meeting of the council progressed, the 2,000 soldiers from the garrison openly fraternized with the crowds. Many of the soldiers, rifles in hand, joined in the demonstrations demanding the resignation of Milukoff.

Vigorous disapproval was also expressed by the council of a statement extensively credited to Foreign Minister Milukoff that Russia aims to crush Germany and Austria.

The first clash between the two elements in the new government came yesterday. The great feeling of indignation was aroused among the workmen and soldiers' delegates by announcement of the provisional government that it intended to stand by the czar's contracts with the allies.

At yesterday's meeting of the council of ministers 2,000 soldiers with loaded rifles were drawn from the Petrograd garrison to guard the building where the government leaders met. Through of citizens gathered there in a gigantic demonstration against Foreign Minister Milukoff.

Speakers from the soldiers and sailors' delegations mounted impromptu rostrums and exhorted the people to join in their demand that the government take all people into their confidence.

The workmen's and soldiers' council held an all-night session last night at which resolutions were adopted utterly disapproving the act of the provisional government and charging failure on their part to keep promises to the workmen and soldiers to admit them to conferences on all important matters.

The official minutes of the meeting, as published today, contain a bitter attack on the provisional government's blanket approval of all contracts and agreements pledged by the former autocratic government with the allies.

First News of Shepherd. The dispatch from Shepherd is the first word of any serious friction between the duma and provisional government and the soldiers and workmen. Various small internal differences have been reported heretofore, but all relative to administrative acts rather than to government policy.

The other hand, the provisional government has heretofore bowed submissively to the demands of the soldiers and workmen.

It has long been known that Germany is bending every resource and using every artifice to stir up trouble among the many diverse elements whose temporary union in force achieved the overthrow of autocracy.

Traction Co., to take effect in 30 days.

Bean's Dilemma.
"With increased wages and cost of production, the butcher, the grocer, the clothier, the druggist and all other purveyors of necessities to the public, increase their prices to offset these advances," says Bean's statement.

"However, the street railway company is allowed no such alternative, and must continue to serve the public at the same rate of fare, although the cost of everything entering into the furnishing of service has no limit."

A new attempt on the part of the railway company to get relief from franchise obligations and other expenses, denied in the recent decision of the commission in the case brought against the city of Tacoma, was seen by city officials in Bean's announcement Friday.

Taking Blaine's Tip.
In that case the commission ruled that it had no jurisdiction to cite the city to appear in an action brought by the public service corporation.

Chairman Blaine, however, intimated in his decision that should the order of procedure be reversed and should an individual bring a complaint against the company, charging inadequate service, the commission might then have power to inquire into the company's financial condition and consider giving relief.

City officials believe that as soon as the proposed reduction in service goes into effect, such a complaint will be filed.

The committee also intends to discourage the consumers of Pierce county from using veal on their tables, contending that more beef should be allowed to mature rather than that the young cattle should be killed for veal.

E. E. Crook, C. A. Cole and H. R. Cox have been named on a committee to investigate the question of meat supply.

Plans are being made for a big public mass meeting at which all aspects of the food question will be discussed.

VANCOUVER, May 4.—So many lots have been planted in gardens here, the advance man arranging for the annual visit of the circus had difficulty in securing a lot big enough to pitch the tents. The circus man said this condition was common in all the smaller cities.

BRITISH SUFFER SETBACK

(United Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, May 4.—The tremendous weight of German reserves flung violently into the line of the British advance has forced a slight falling back of British troops from advanced positions captured yesterday. Field Marshal Haig reported today.

His statement, however, revealed progress on an entirely new sector from that in which the British drive of the past 48 hours has been centered—north-east of St. Quentin and northeast of Hargicourt.

Hargicourt is two miles distant from the main German line of communication between Cambrai and St. Quentin. But little fighting has been reported from this sector for the past ten days.

Encircling Lens.
Lens was three-fourths encircled by today's fierce fighting, marking the resumption of the British offensive. The British 5th and 6th divisions, north of Loos, on the north, southward through Lievin, Givenchy, Vimy and eastward to around Acheville and Fresnoy.

It is around the last two towns that the heaviest fighting continued today.

British forces were holding firmly of the Wotan line, which was made complete by rupture of the so-called "switch line" from Oppy north to Droocourt, in fighting which has been almost continuous since early yesterday.

Panzer Line.
Furtive to the south on the 12-mile front, over which Field Marshal Haig is staging his attack, the British have driven a wedge through the Hindenburg front.

They have punctured the line to within the German positions, and in their "strategic retreat"—a powerful system of defenses around Quant. Here, too, the fighting was continued in desperate intensity today after hardy a let up in twenty-four hours.

British forces were holding nearly one-third of a mile of the German trenches on this vaulted Hindenburg line today, located between Fontaine-les-Croisilles and Bullecourt, in the face of terrific counter-attacks launched by the German commanders.

MISSING OF ROCKINGHAM ARE RESCUED

(United Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, May 4.—Loss of life in the torpedoing of the American steamer Rockingham was reduced to the two members of her crew killed outright in the attack, when the third boatload of survivors was picked up today by a British ship.

The third boat carried the 14 men heretofore listed as missing. The rescue was announced by the admiralty.

How far the commission could go in granting relief—whether it could relieve the company of the gross earnings tax, street paving and other obligations—would be a question that would then have to be fought out in a hearing.

Just a "Paper" Trouble?
As far as the actual financial condition of the T. R. & P. Co. is concerned, the only information that it is in desperate straits comes from Manager Bean.

The records show that it is merely a subsidiary concern to the \$25,000,000 Puget Sound Traction Light & Power Co., which owns 99.1 per cent of the Puget Sound Electric railway, which in turn owns 100 per cent of the stock of the T. R. & P.

The many companies interlocked in the big electric octopus make it doubtful what the financial condition of any one of its subsidiary parts is.

FIGHTING CONTROL OF FOOD

(United Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4.—With a tremendous emergency war program just ahead, congressional leaders settled down to a fight today to adjourn by June 1.

After two days of discussion of the embargo section in the espionage bill, Senator Overman, in charge of the measure, declared if the senate did not "get down to cases" today he would move for night sessions from now on.

If adjournment is to be accomplished by June 1, it is admitted that there will have to be day and night sessions most of the time from now on.

A determined fight is inevitable upon the food bill, introduced in the house by Chairman Lever of the agricultural committee, giving president Wilson dictatorial powers in directing the production, distribution and prices of food and all other necessities of life during the war.

Out of the food bill fight promises to arise two collateral contests from a prohibition bill to be introduced by Senator Gronna providing that no foodstuffs be used in the manufacture of alcohol and various measures directed at food speculation.

The drastic shipping bill, coming up from the White House soon, may develop a snarl, but for the most part both houses are ready to give the president all the power he wants within the limits of the constitution.

The conscription bill was before the house and senate army committees today. The principal differences—age limits for the draft and the question of sending the Roosevelt division to France—are expected to be ironed out within a few days.

13 GUNNERS ARE MISSING

(United Press Leased Wire.)
LONDON, May 4.—Thirteen American naval gunners are among the 16 men of the American steamer Rockingham still reported missing in an American consular report today. Thirty-three of those aboard the torpedoed steamer were rescued.

Chief Gunner Wood, U. S. N., is among the missing listed in the consular report.

TREASON PLOT IS CHARGED

(United Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4.—German socialists in this country who attempt to force or influence a separate peace between Russia and Germany will be dealt with to the fullest extent of American law, if their act can be proven.

The state department indicated this unmistakable today following publication of charges by J. G. Phelps Stokes, wealthy socialist, that some of the German wings of the American socialists are trying to force such a peace.

American law provides for dealing with such cases as an extremely treasonable act.

It is known that the government has noted the Stokes charges and that it will endeavor to ascertain whether any of the men Stokes named or any others are trying to manipulate such a peace through their Russian comrades.

The new censorship will be applied vigorously to prevent them from communicating with the Slav leaders.

The state department had its first news of the differences between provisional government and the workmen's and soldiers' committee from the United Press dispatch from William G. Shepherd today.

Authorities, however, still claimed to be hopeful that internal troubles ultimately will vanish and that the Russian army will stand steadfast against the Germans.

Yes, It Was Wet and Cold

During the last 25 years only three Aprils have been colder, and only two wetter than April, 1917. The Aprils of 1911, 1900 and 1903 were colder. In 1892 and 1904 more rain fell.

PLAN DRIVE AT U-BOAT

(United Press Leased Wire.)
WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4.—Heavy mining of practically the entire North sea has been under consideration between the allies and the United States as an efficient means of thwarting Germany's submarine campaign, it became officially known today.

In addition to this scheme, there has been official consideration of means of wrecking the U-boats at their bases.

LINER HAS A CLOSE SHAVE

(United Press Leased Wire.)
PARIS, May 4.—The French liner Rochambeau, recently arrived at a French port, narrowly escaped a torpedo fired by a German submarine, according to one of her passengers today.

The torpedo passed a bare ten yards astern. The Rochambeau immediately fired a dozen shells at the submarine. Whether these found their mark is not known.

BRAZIL IS A STEP NEARER THE WAR!

(United Press Leased Wire.)
RIO DE JANEIRO, May 4.—Brazil inclined closer today to a declaration of war against Germany.

Appointment of Under Secretary Souza Dantas as temporary minister of foreign affairs, succeeding Dr. Lauro Muller, was everywhere regarded as a strengthening of the war advocates demand that Brazil go farther than her diplomatic break.
