## CAVALRY SQUADRON FORMED IN STATE

The state of Washington has an entire cavalry squadron Friday with the recognition by the state of three new troops, in addition to Troop B of Tacoma.  
These are to be known as Troop A of Ellensburg, Troop C of Wenatchee and Troop D of Spokane.  
Together, they are to be known as the cavalry squadron of the Washington national guard.  
Formal announcement of the formation of the squadron was made by Adj. Gen. Maurice Thompson, who also announced the appointment of Capt. Hartwell W. Palmer, formerly with Troop B, as major in command.  
Palmer, since war was declared, has been busy organizing the companies.

## BOY ESCAPES WHILE JAILKEEPER SLEEPS

Snaking down stairs through the girls' department, William Caldwell, age 15, wanted by the government for rifling the mails and forging a check, threw a chair through the glass window on the lower floor of the county detention home on G street, and escaped with a companion at 4 a. m. Friday.  
The chair was found 15 feet out in the street, and the glass was scattered far out into the street.  
Caldwell had been working as a janitor in the Irvington apartments before his arrest.  
C. J. Backus, assistant postmaster, who arrested him, claims the boy told him he had forged one check and cashed it, and that he had other checks in his possession which he intended to cash.  
Today was the first time that any boy has ever succeeded in getting between the boys' and girls' wing without arousing Lorenzo D. Garwood, the detention home keeper.  
Caldwell is the son of W. G. Caldwell, a street car employe. He has been arrested twice in Seattle, and once in Castle Rock after he had stolen an automobile from Tacoma.  
It is thought that the boy has gone to one of the neighboring towns.  
He is described as 5 feet 7 inches in height, wearing a blue pinck back suit.  
He weighs 140 pounds.

### Contract With T. R. & P. Signed

A formal contract between the city of Tacoma and the Tacoma Railway & Power Co., embodying all municipal car line points agreed upon at a recent public conference, was read to the council Friday and approved. Mayor Fawcett and City Controller Shoemaker were instructed to sign the contract and forward it to the T. R. & P. officials for their signatures.  
The contract provides that the city shall take over the present municipal line as soon as the Todd shipyards extension is completed. It provides that there shall be no transfers between city and T. R. & P. cars unless arrangements are made later.

### CENSORSHIP IS STRICKEN OUT

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 4.—The house this afternoon struck out the censorship clause of the spy bill by a vote of 220 to 167.  
The clause was killed through adoption of an amendment by Representative Graham. Speaker Van Dusen, providing elimination of the censorship feature. Speaker Clark, Representative Shirley, Kentucky, and other democratic leaders, and Miss Rankin of Montana voted for the amendment striking out the censorship provision.
