

LITTLE TELLS HOW HE IS ACQUIRING VAST MILITARY POSTS

J. T. S. Lyle, special counsel for Pierce county in the army post project, today reported to the board of county commissioners on the progress of work up to May 1.

It was the first announcement of any sort that has been made public regarding the actual condemnation plans. Speaking of the proceedings necessary to obtain the 70,000-acre tract, he wrote:

8,000 Parties to Suit.
"The task before us was to get the information and data to bring the necessary parties into court, and to present legal evidence to a jury so that a tract of land of approximately 12 by 18 miles could be condemned. The number of pieces of land to be taken is approximately 1,500, and the number of parties 8,000. The number of miles to be traveled by our witnesses or appraisers, as they are commonly called, will be approximately 1,000.

"The names of the owner or owners, together with others interested, for each and every separate parcel of the 1,500 must be ascertained; each of the 8,000 parties must be located if possible, the value of each tract must be determined by careful appraisal and the improvements must also be inspected and valued. This will include the cruising of all the timber, whatever its character.

Need for Haste.
"At any time this would be an undertaking which, because of its size, might require two years to complete. With us, however, the situation was much more complex for the reason that the military necessities of the United States require that all of this land shall be condemned in the very shortest period of time. With us, it is not the question 'Can it be done?' but instead, 'It must be done.'

"To get the results within the time required, and yet to do justice to the county and the landholders, requires a centralized and efficient organization.

"There cannot be any lost motion anywhere.

Plan of Campaign.
"By March 15, the detail of the plan had been worked out, and its essential features were presented to you as a board, at which time you authorized me to engage two condemnation land experts.

"It was necessary for these men to make a preliminary investigation of the whole tract for the purposes; first, in order that we might plan the number of suits that we should bring, as the tract is so large that the mass of evidence would be altogether too great to present to one jury; and second, in order that we might have the necessary information available when the officer designated by Gen. Bell arrived to determine just what land was wanted, and decide on the tracts which might be eliminated, in accordance with our agreement with the secretary of war.

Ready on Time.
"We were asked to have this information ready by the week of April 22, and I am glad to report that it was ready on that date.

"The important part of the work was to make arrangements to get the descriptions of the land, and the necessary parties to the suit, which includes the owners of the land and other parties interested and their judgment creditors, the owners of mortgages, the holders of leases, and all others having any kind of an interest in the land.

"We first prepared form sheets, and put as large a force as could be used at the office of the assessor to get the description of the lands, and such other information as could be obtained from the books of the assessor. In the meantime we conferred with the owners of the abstract plants and worked out a system to be used in obtaining the other necessary data relative to the titles of the land. Bids were then asked for from the abstract companies so that a contract could be entered into by the board for the work to be done by the abstract company. This part of the business was so timed that the abstract companies' work on the day after the work in the assessor's office was completed.

Office System.
"The progress which the abstract companies are making indicates that they will be able to have their work done on time.

"We next worked out a complete office system of handling the information obtained relative to the titles and also the data, which will be compiled concerning the land.

"In the short time at our disposal it has required much search to pick out the ideal person for each part to be performed. So far we have been very successful, and in each case we feel that we have found the right person for each task. At the date of this report our organization has reached the point where we are doing the maximum amount of work with as large a force as will permit efficient work to be done, bearing in mind that to make mistakes in the data means delay in the end. The nature of the material received limits the number of the force to be at work at any one time. At present we have working in the office three stenographers, one expert clerk, one draftsman and three checkers, part of whom work nights. This force should be added to as soon as more men can be effectively used.

Army Gives Aid.
"In the field work we have been extremely fortunate. The war department has detailed a force of 130 men, 100 of whom are engineers, to make a survey of the whole tract. In addition to this, Gen. Bell also detailed

for our work an expert court engineer. The number of men detailed will give an indication of the great assistance which is being rendered by the war department. These men will map the whole area.

"The work of actually investigating the land for the purpose of arriving at its market value will probably start next week, and a schedule has been arranged which will bring this work to a conclusion by the time we are ready for trial. It is deemed advisable to have the number of witnesses as small as possible, and at the present writing our plan is to use a template the use of more than 15 witnesses, some of whom will only

WILHELM IS STILL SUPREME

AMSTERDAM, May 5.—The German constitution committee voted today in effect to continue Germany's present monarchical system and to shut off complete democracy, according to interpretation put upon Berlin dispatches here today.

"The committee began the day's session with adoption of a revolutionary plan to require the chancellor to countersign all orders and ordinances of the kaiser and to make him responsible to the reichstag for such orders.

But later the committee utterly vitiated this reform by rejecting a proposal that the chancellor be made liable to dismissal on a majority vote of the reichstag.

The present recommendations of the committee, therefore, on their face, curb the power of the kaiser by making his chief minister assume responsibility for all his acts of government to the reichstag, but in reality, by making the reichstag impotent to punish the chief minister for the kaiser's acts, leave the kaiser's powers absolutely unchanged.

be used in special cases.

"The work of selecting witnesses has been enormous. Some 200 applications have been received. In order that we might set an idea as to their qualifications prior to personal interviews we prepared a questionnaire containing a series of questions which was sent to the applicants. This information has proved to be very valuable.

Efficiency Only.
"Considering the fact that we have been so pushed for time, it has required much planning to be able to meet and see the applicants and the many friends who have appeared in their behalf. However, the selections are not

being made on the say-so of any one, but we are making our own personal investigations, with the idea of finding the right man for each particular place. All the selections have not yet been made.

Lyle discussed the handling of the bond sales, which has been reported heretofore in the papers, and continued:

"Another important feature of the work at hand is the fact that the military necessities of the United States may at any time require the immediate occupation of a part of the land.

Plan For Speed.
"On April 12, it was decided to hold the training school for officers on a portion of the land and

accordingly request was made for the possession of about 1,800 acres which was selected near Dupont. The problem presented of getting possession of the land prior to condemnation was very acute and had to be settled almost at once.

The plan worked out, which was approved by you, was to rely on the patriotism of the owners and ask them to deed the land to the county leaving the compensation to be fixed in the condemnation cases and paying them as liquidated damages for the use of the land from the time possession would be given by the condemnation proceedings an amount which would be equivalent to interest at the rate of 5 per cent per annum on

the amount finally awarded in the condemnation case.

"This plan was agreeable to the owners but fortunately no transfers had been actually made at the time a change was made in the plans of the war department so that possession of the land was not required.

Censorship On.
"The military necessities of the United States are such that we are liable to be called upon at any time for possession of the land. At this point it should be stated, that all communications in connection with this matter are of a non-military nature and therefore we are bound by the military censorship and are not at liberty

to freely discuss any information that may have been contained in any of the official communications.

"We think, however, it would not be in violation of the censorship to say at this time that the war department has not up to this date asked for the possession of any land except the request relative to the tract near Dupont which was cancelled as above stated. This does not mean, however, that we are not mindful of the fact that we are liable to be called at any time to act and act quickly, and for this reason we have plans prepared to act when the time comes.

No Change in Plan.
"In this connection it should be stated that there has been no change in the plan of acquiring all this land by condemnation and that everything will be done in accordance with the same as agreed upon with the pledges made to the people prior to the bond election. It is the only way in which the project can be carried out in fairness and justice to all.

"We are in close touch with the war department and are promptly following their wishes in every particular. The act under which we are proceeding requires us to acquire such land as the war department selects."
