'TACOMA JAIL IS DUNGEON'

"I've been in jails in Turkey, and in Palestine, but I must say that I have never seen a worse dungeon in all my travels than the city jail in Tacoma."

"This was the verdict of Dr. Christian Quevill Thursday, after he had visited an acquaintance at the city jail. It was his first visit to the prison.

"I never saw such filth or neglect of humans in any of the jails of Turkey, and I visited many of them there," said the physician.

"This jail is a breeding place for disease. It is a dark basement dungeon, where the men sleep on dirty, filthy canvas cots with nothing but a filthy, microbe-riddled quilt over them.

"Tacoma should certainly be ashamed that it is maintaining such an institution. It is a disgrace to a civilized community."

Teaches Pipe Organ to Sing; Says 'Mama' ALCOHOL WILL BE EVIDENCE

CLEVELAND, O., Aug. 7.—An organ recital a few years from now will be actually a recital of words, besides music. And the organ will do it all.

For the last ten years, Prof. Dayton C. Miller of the Case School of Applied Science, here, has been at work inventing an organ which will actually sing words. He has already formed combinations of pipes to speak the vowels and to say "mama" and "papa."


"I have only to perfect the instrument to say some simple sentence," says Dr. Miller. "Then the problem—of having an orchestra and chorus in one—will be solved."

Dr. Miller has invented one complicated machine, he calls the phonodeik.

To make the organ speak, Dr. Miller says he had to analyze the simplest sound first, into its component parts. And to do this he had to see the sounds. Hearing them wouldn't do.

So he invented the phonodeik which shows you, in black and white, the sound you speak into it. The writing is in cross strokes of various shapes, each sound having a different stroke, which Dr. Miller calls a "curve."

Dr. Miller photographs these strokes, runs them thru a machine that analyzes them into their simplest parts, puts them on another complicated instrument that checks up the analysis, builds his organ pipes to correspond with the mathematical calculations and produces a sound from the organ like that spoken into the phonodeik.

"In my study of sound," adds Dr. Miller, "I find there are certain fundamental sounds, as ah, oh, oo, and others, around which consonants are placed to form our words. It would be easier to learn to speak if words were spelled as they are sounded.

"It is possible to develop this idea into production of a universal scientific language, based on a certain number of fundamental sounds, easiest to speak."

SPUDS FOR EVERYBODY

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 9.—One bushel of potatoes extra for every man, woman and child in the country during the next year is promised if the potato crop lives up to the department of agriculture August estimate.

FORM LABOR COMMISSION

WASHINGTON, D. C., Aug. 9.—Creation of a "labor adjustment commission" of three representatives each of the government, employers and labor was officially announced today.

The personnel of the commission is not ready to be announced. It is designed to have jurisdiction over all labor disputes concerning wages or employment conditions on government contracts.

U. S. To Control Ocean Shipping

WASHINGTON, Aug. 9.—Anglo-American joint control over trans-Atlantic shipping was brought nearer at a conference today between Chairman Hurley of the U. S. shipping board, and Commissioner, British traffic.

At the close of the session, Hurley announced that the requisition of American ship space would probably be ordered next week.

This will give the government absolute control over ocean freight rates, the loading, unloading and movement of vessels flying the American flag.

ALCOHOL WILL BE EVIDENCE

A fact expected to appear at the inquest Thursday afternoon upon the body of Mrs. A. E. Peterson, one of the three victims of the drowning at the Narrows Tuesday night, is that the analysis made by City Chemist Henry of liquid found in a bottle labeled "Ammonia," in the pocket of John Bloomquist, now under arrest in connection with the case, shows the presence of 30 per cent alcohol.

Bloomquist told the officers when arrested that the bottle contained something to drink, but claimed that it was a non-alcoholic beverage.

Witnesses subpoenaed for the inquest are C. A. Hallin, Ruth Hallin, G. Franzen, Mrs. Anna Franzen, Ed Peterson, August Peterson, Philip Anderson, Simon Sahlin, J. N. Burdell and Hilda Burdell.

Most of the witnesses were on the wharf at the time the rowboat capsized, throwing Mrs. Peterson, Miss Agnes Anderson and Bloomquist into the water.

Albert Peterson, who was drowned while trying to save his mother, had been standing with the group on the wharf. Sahlin also rushed into the water in an unsuccessful attempt to help.

Sahlin could not be found Thursday morning by the sheriff's office to be served with the subpoena.

BANDY IS ARRESTED AS THIEF

With Gale Bandy, former Stadium high school athlete, in jail at Los Angeles, and nearly \$1,000 worth of loot in possession of the Tacoma police board, detectives were investigating Thursday the extent of alleged robberies laid at the door of the young Tacoma.

The loot includes eight new automobile tires, seven magnetos for high-powered cars, and dozens of cans of expensive motor oil and grease.

Bandy was arrested in Los Angeles charged with stealing a car there. He is said to have confessed to the theft of a car in Seattle.

Tacoma police found the Seattle car in a Broadway garage Thursday night, where Bandy had left it three weeks ago, and with it was the loot.

Police believe that Bandy stole the auto outfit from some garage, intending to open a garage or shop of his own.

He is married, and his wife left this week for California, after hearing that he was in jail.

Bandy was a champion hurdler when he attended Stadium high, and took a leading part in all sports.
