

BUNKS FOR TRANSPORTS

The Carman Manufacturing Co. of Tacoma is supplying 6,000 bunks ordered by the Bremerton navy yard to be used in transforming the big steamers of the Ore at Northern Pacific into troop transports.

The first lot was delivered Monday at the Commercial dock for shipment to the navy yard.

DRYDOCK MENDS ITSELF

The big floating drydock of the Todd shipyard was called on Monday to perform its first service—that of drydocking itself.

The drydock drydocked one of its own units slightly damaged when the new county ferry City of Vancouver bumped into it. Each unit of the dock was so constructed as to receive another unit.

BOY CLEARED BY JURY

After he had told on the witness stand the story of how he had killed his best friend with a gun that he thought wasn't loaded, Martin Jensen, 15, of Gig Harbor was cleared at the coroner's inquest Monday into the killing of Alexia Dandillon, 14, of Seattle. The shooting occurred Saturday in a little cabin two miles from Gig Harbor.

"Accidental death, due to carelessness," was the jury's verdict.

100 ASK CONCESSIONS

The 100-acre "fun zone" at Camp Lewis will be a real amusement city. This is indicated by the receipt of more than 100 bids for amusement concessions by the Camp Lewis amusement committee, which will give a definite decision on the bids Wednesday.

One bidder said he is ready to invest \$50,000 cash.

Most of the bids are for establishment of movie houses, shooting galleries and vaudeville shows. Several dance halls are included.

A rigid price scale will prevent concession holders from making excessive profits.
