Veteran Says Lloyd Madden Has Style That May Gain Him Title

Lloyd Madden, the sensational Seattle lightweight who meets Frankie Tucker of San Francisco in a Tacoma ring tonight, is one of the few modern boxers who have developed the old-time fighting punch.

That's the opinion of Walter Oathart, 79-year-old veteran of the ring, who is spending the season in the Northwest, looking the boxers over and making a little spare change by giving his Indian club, battle-ax and sword exhibitions at the smokers.

Big Boost. — "Madden is the best looking youngster I have seen in my travels this year," said the aged pioneer of bare-knuckle fighting days.

"I saw him whip Chet Neff in Seattle a few weeks ago, and I want to say that Madden has a future ahead of him. He sticks to the old-time style of boxing, which has always proved the most effective. He stands up to his man, blocks the blows, and comes back with sledge-hammer punches that would knock a horse down. None of the love-pat stuff for Madden.

"He reminds me most of Jack Dempsey and Joe Gans. I'd like to have Madden in my care for a few weeks, and teach him a few more tricks of the old-style boxers. With a good cross-over punch and a few other new ideas, he'd become champion, without a doubt."

Cathart knows. — Cathart is a keen observer of boxers, despite his age, and many of the best trainers in the country have listened to his advice. His high praise of Madden, coming voluntarily, certainly means something to the Seattle boy.

Madden will meet a real foe in Frankie Tucker of San Francisco tonight at the Eagles smoker. Tucker, besides having his sister for a manager, has proven that he deserves a lot of credit in his own name. He has cleaned up many stars in California and has already started on a triumphant tour of the Northwest.

Two Kinds of Interference and Both Are Effective, Says Dobie

There are two kinds of interference. In one the shoulder is used, in the other the man throws his body horizontally across the lower part of his opponent's body. It is very important that football players should thoroughly master both. Shoulder interference is most effectively used by the backs in blocking off defensive ends and in cases where the men are running too fast to permit of the diving interference. In all cases where the ends and line-men are sent down to get the secondary defense, I think the most effective form is the diving interference.

Under this same heading may be treated the opening of the line by the line-men.

This is most important and really is the keynote to successful line-bucking. No back, however fast and powerful, can penetrate a good line unless the line first has been opened or partially opened by the team-mates.

The end should be well drilled in boxing the opposing tackle and this can best be accomplished by hooking the tackle just about waist-high with the shoulders and carrying him either to the right or left, whichever the play calls for.

In cases where the tackles play directly in front of the end, the best method for the end is to charge his man hard and fast with the shoulders a little above the knees and count on the impetus of the play helping him in backing the tackle up.

The five center men are at somewhat of a disadvantage, because they have not freedom of action given the end-men. In cases where the opposing line-men are playing directly in front they should follow the same principle laid down above for the end.

Where the opposition is playing to the side it is well to charge into them low and from the side at such an angle that they are most easily moved in the direction desired. It chances are that the added impetus given by the backs will complete the job.
