## CATTLE POISON PLOT

Fred Turner, a German, is held as a suspect, following the death of 40 cattle on a Wyoming ranch on which he was employed.

## DESPERATE IN CHICAGO

(United Press Leased Wire.) CHICAGO, Oct. 19.—Chicago's fuel situation became desperate today when freezing temperatures combined with the coal famine. At the same time big coal dealers declared the city was rapidly depleting its surplus and that the four days' idleness of striking Illinois miners had created a shortage of 1,250,000 tons here. Hospitals and other public institutions are on "a hand to mouth" fuel program, it was said.

## TACOMA RED CROSS WORK IS NOT ALL FOR SOLDIERS

The work of the Red Cross isn't all knitting socks for soldiers, and winding bandages for them, and sending nurses to European hospitals where the knowledge that a bomb may drop in unannounced at any moment adds glamor to the day's work. Some of it is the prosaic business of hunting jobs and doctors and houses and friends for soldiers' families who are fighting just as desperately, but with less glamor about it. For the it is not the intention of the government to take as soldiers men whose families will be in need without them, yet circumstances sometimes change quickly after a man has enlisted or been drafted. And, too, there are other kinds of need than financial, which the government cannot know about.

Many Duties. That is what the civilian relief committee of the Red Cross is for. And the things that have come to the Tacoma Red Cross civilian committee to be done, have already proved its value. The Tacoma committee consists of Frank B. Cole, chairman, Frank A. Magill, Mrs. D. E. Roberts, Mrs.

S. S. Healey, Mrs. John S. Baker, Mrs. George B. Woodbridge and Mrs. Cora Ainey. Mrs. J. P. Weyhaeuser, president of the Tacoma chapter, is an ex-officio member. Its money comes out of Red Cross funds. The Tacoma committee already has united a husband and wife who were being driven apart by the mistaken interference of relatives, while the man was unable to come back and set things right. Work for Women. It has found work for a mother and daughter who needed it. It has found the proper local authorities for the wife of a Canadian soldier to appeal to. It has given money where money was necessary, but giving money is not its principal idea. Other kinds of help are more often needed than money, because, as has been said, Uncle Sam doesn't intend to take men whose families will be in want if they go. ## MILLIONS IN BONDS TAKEN BY SAMMIES

(United Press Leased Wire.) AMERICAN FIELD HEADQUARTERS, Oct. 20.—American Sammies are not only going to "do their bit" in the trenches fighting the Huns—but they are setting an example for folks back home in a record-breaking purchase of Liberty bonds. Several million dollars in subscriptions were reported today. The exact total is being withheld. The various American expeditionary units are keenly competing for the honor of subscribing the greatest amount. Today the heavy artillery claimed the top figure—with nearly \$300,000 pledged and several batteries still to be heard from. The Liberty loan drive has been on here "somewhere in France," for two weeks. Gen. Pershing himself inaugurated the campaign by a proclamation urging his men to subscribe for patriotic reasons.
