## PRIVATE IS GIVEN 25 YEARS

Private Glynn A. Newell, 26 years old, headquarters troop, Camp Lewis court-martialed for a statutory offense against a 14-year-old girl and deserting 25 years' confinement at hard labor at the penitentiary at Fort Leavenworth, Kas., dishonorably discharged from the army, and forfeiture of all pay and allowances.

The order announcing the commanding general's approval of the sentence has been sent to every organization of the command, "as a warning to other possible offenders of the seriousness of sex offenses when committed by persons in military service and of the penalty that may be expected in case of conviction by general court-martial for such offenses."

Newell, the girl, another soldier and a woman, it was charged, went to Everett Oct. 3 in a stolen car. Newell obtained a marriage license on the morning of Oct. 4, but did not marry the girl, saying he did not have the money. Both the statutory offense and the desertion might be given the death penalty, in time of war.


