## SUGGEST REBATE DEMAND TACOMA GIRL IS SLUGGED

A request by telephone operators that the public refuse to use its phones while the strike is on, later demanding a cash rebate for lack of service, and an open defiance of the strikers by the telephone company in advertising for permanent employes to take the strikers' places, were Friday's developments in the Tacoma strike situation.

Miss Mathilda Gruidl, secretary of the girls' union, issued a written notice asking the public to cooperate with the girls.

"Don't order your telephone out, this only gives the company \$3.50 when you order it back after the strike is over," said the notice. This is a warning to persons who might feel they were helping the strikers by discontinuing service.

"Make demand for a rebate for loss of service while the strike is on. They cannot collect where service is not furnished," was the further warning. "Don't use the unfair telephone. Help us win the strike."

The telephone company opened the second day of the strike by advertising for telephone girls to take the place of those who strike, and also for linemen and electricians. Permanent positions are offered.

"We gave service yesterday that was about 50 per cent of the normal," said Manager Schlarb. "Today we are giving 75 per cent service, and by tomorrow it will be much better."

"Many of our old girls are coming back. We are opening more switchboards almost every hour. Those patrons whose telephones are dead may rest assured that they will get service within a very short time now."

Manager Schlarb announced Friday that a colonel in the U. S. army at Camp Lewis had commended highly those girls who stayed on the job.

"I am not at liberty to give the colonel's name," said Schlarb. "But he called up yesterday and asked for the chief operator."

"I am Colonel So-and-So," he told her. "I want to commend you girls for staying on the job, particularly during these trying times. You deserve special credit for refusing to go on strike and cripple the country during a national crisis. I want to tell you that I consider that those persons who went out on strike as in the same class with the ones we shall soon be sent out to fight."

Union officials said that only one former employe was left at the switchboards, all other girls having joined the strike late Thursday.

Three men had stayed with the company. One of them, J. E. Gearson, was given permission by strikers to stay on his job, because he is eligible to a pension in four months. James Faithful, at the Camp Lewis station, and George Wolfe, on "toll trouble," are the other men now working.

The strikers will give a dance a week from Saturday.

"It will either be a benefit for the strike, or a jubilee over our victory," said James Sutton, of the strikers. "Personally, I believe we will all be working for the government by that time. It will have charge of the company's business."

**SUPPLY STATION AT SOUTH TACOMA**

U. S. Quartermaster Ruhlin has leased the three-story brick building on Edison near State street, South Tacoma, for storage of reserve army supplies. This practically moves part of the quartermaster's office, which has always been in Seattle, to Tacoma.

Knocked unconscious by two young men on Broadway near 9th late Thursday night, Miss Agnes Hunt, employed in a downtown bus station, is confined to her bed Friday while police are searching for the assailants.

The men are reported to have picked up the unconscious woman and taken her to her rooms at the Lansing hotel. Then they fled from the scene.

Miss Hunt was on her way home from work, she told Detective McKay Friday. As she was hurrying along Broadway, the men approached her from behind. Both had been drinking, she said. As they came up opposite to her, one of them plucked her sleeve and said:

"Hello, kid, come on and have a drink with us?"

Miss Hunt swung around with all her strength and struck the man in the neck with her fist. The other man replied with a blow to her temple which knocked her unconscious to the sidewalk. She awoke later in her room, attended by a girl friend.

Allen A. Boyle, 124 North G st., was one of the witnesses and reported the occurrence to the police.

Miss Hunt said that she had never seen either of her assailants before. They evidently had a machine standing near the curb, for they picked up the girl and hurried her away before a crowd could gather.

## PHONE FOLKS WILL PARADE

Striking telephone operators and linemen and their sympathizers will parade Saturday evening at 7 o'clock from Labor headquarters, 1153 1/2 Broadway, thru the downtown district.

The procession will form at headquarters at 6:30. Delegations from outside points also involved in the strike will join in the parade, those in charge have been notified.
