CAMPITO TRY FOR LIGHTWEIGHT TITLE

When Eddie Campi, king of the Pacific coast lightweights, appears in the Eagles' ring Thursday night for his six-round battle with Frankie Tucker, local boxing fans will have an opportunity of watching the work of one of the fastest and toughest battlers in the west.

Campi has won an enviable record all along the coast mainly because of his wonderful speed and his double-barreled punch. Dan Salt, the veteran Seattle boxing promoter, has been coaching the young Californian for the past year, and is ready now to start for the east with his charge.

"I believe that Campi is in a condition now where he can defeat most of the lightweights at the top of the list," said Salt today. "And I'm certainly going to give him the chance to try for the lightweight title."

Frankie Tucker has already been seen in action here, and if he boxes with Campi like he did with Lloyd Madden it should be a sensational match.

Other bouts on the card are all top-notchers. They are: Joe Gorman vs. Bert Forbes; Joe Hill vs. Earl Conner; Marty Foley vs. Mike Pete, and Walter Porsch vs. Eddie Hammond.

Dobie Starts Toward High Grid Record

Altho Gilmour Dobie this year lost his first football game in 12 years when the navy went down to defeat before West Virginia, the former U. of Washington coach has an excellent chance to set a new record. His squad of middies have piled up 307 points in four games.

While this is not so phenomenal as the achievement of Georgia Tech, which overwhelmed a team 222 to 0 last year, it is indeed creditable, considering that the points were made against such teams as Haverford, Carlisle, Maryland State and Western Reserve, none of which had been considered set-ups at the start of the season.

It is not likely any college of importance will equal the Navy's record if Dobie can keep his team going at its present speed.

CHAMP HERMAN WINS \$6,300 PURSE, THEN ASKS FOR EXEMPTION

(United Press Leased Wire.) NEW ORLEANS, La., Nov. 7.—A new record for gate receipts for bantam championship bouts, was established at the Louisiana auditorium here Monday night in the Pete Herman-Frankie Burns contest. Receipts were \$13,176.20, of which 10 per cent was deducted for the war tax. Herman pulled down \$6,300; Auditorium stockholders and Burns divided the remaining \$5,559 on a fifty-fifty basis.

Herman today denied that he ever agreed to join the army if he defeated Frankie Burns. "I have made two appeals for exemption on the ground that I am the sole support of aged parents, who are too old to work and who cannot read nor write," he said. Herman's latest appeal was filed three days ago and is still pending. He was given a two months' reprieve to fill several fight engagements, but has never let up in his efforts to obtain exemption.


