

# PATCHING SHIPYARD TROUBLES

Following conferences this week between union representatives and representatives of the Tacoma Shipbuilding Co., Barbare Bros. and the Wright shipyards in Tacoma, Joseph H. Lyons, secretary of the Central Labor Council, announced Saturday that a settlement is near in the controversy which has hampered work on building ships for the government here.

Conferences were held Tuesday and Friday nights. Another meeting will be held Monday. Henry White and E. C. Snyder, federal mediators, have been taking an active part in the negotiations. In an effort to end the strike called on the Wright yards and to prevent a further tie-up in the Tacoma shipbuilding and Barbare yards, which have refused to recognize the shipwrights' and shipyard laborers' unions.

# IGNORE WILSON APPEAL


# Thieves Tie Up Munny Line Work

# SUSPECT TRIO OF SLUGGING

Acting on statements by Sylvester Cooper, a butcher who was given a five-year penitentiary sentence last week for highway robbery, Tacoma police Friday night rounded up three alleged members of a slugging gang and are holding them for trial.

The prisoners, Tom Foley, John Ohom and Clarence Jackson, are charged with having committed the crime for which Cooper was sent to the penitentiary. If their guilt is proven, Governor Lister will be asked to pardon Cooper.

The robbery occurred Nov. 11, when a group of sluggers attacked Alexander Wilrokh, a logging camp cook, on the 13th street hill, beat him unmercifully and robbed him of \$45. Wilrokh seized Cooper and held him until help came.

Cooper maintains the other three men did the slugging. He was in the vicinity and rushed up to force the trio to desist, he says. The three sluggers ran away, leaving Wilrokh prostrate.
