In An Old Castle in France

How young and new America seem to the U. S. soldiers in France is described in a letter received in Tacoma by the parents of Russell Craig, who is in France with the 116th signal corps. He left Camp Mills Nov. 25 and arrived in France on Dec. 1.
In his last letter young Craig told of being removed from the regular army barracks and quartered in an old chateau not far from Verdun, the scene of the famous battle where the French showed the world what a Frenchman could do.
