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Utility Bonds

The very erudite editor of a Tacoma daily which is desperately fearful that the people may choose to take over the control of the street railways which they now support but do not control is making some more strange discoveries.

He has convinced himself that there is no such thing as a utility bond, and can be no such thing.

The very idea, he asserts—calmly ignoring facts, the law and the news stories in his own columns—is "nonsense." He goes on:

Either the city backs the proposed bond issues with its credit or the bonds will be merely so many pieces of engraved paper without marketable values. Investors throughout the United States are not so imbecile as to put their money in these times into bonds which have no securities other than the questionable earning power of the lines. Without the credit of the city behind them such an issue amounts practically to wildcat securities. With the credit of the city behind them, all taxpayers become liable to make up the deficit in operating expenses and interest.

And yet every well informed Tacoman will recall that within recent months we have built one municipal line with these very same bonds, that our magnificent light plant was financed in the same way, and that we drink water every day from a plant bought with utility bonds.

In not one of those cases is the bond a lien to any extent whatever on the City of Tacoma; they are a lien only on the receipts of their respective plant. That anybody should attempt to arise at this late day, when the legality and good standing of these bonds is everywhere recognized and after they have been repeatedly sustained by the courts, to deny their very existence is no compliment to the public intelligence. The editor might as well attempt to demonstrate there is no such thing as a street car.

The whole truth is such bonds would be no burden on the city. They would be a burden only on the street car passengers, and these passengers right today and for many years past have been carrying identically the same burden plus some others.

Think Up New Reason

There is nobody so unconsciously funny as a reactionary, be it individual or newspaper.

In Tacoma at present, for instance, we have the amusing spectacle of a newspaper which always has been pronounced hostile to the jitney bus warning the public against taking over the street railway system, because 10 years from now, it says, auto transportation will have supplanted trolley lines!

In other words, the paper, seeing this development coming, has been trying to help it along by standing in its way!

Or, was it right when in the past it always told us how dangerous, unreliable, freakish, unsuited to bad weather conditions and the rest of it the jitney bus is?
