

CHAPLAIN GETS HUNS BY PROXY

(United Press Leased Wire.)

WITH THE AMERICAN ARMY IN LORRAINE, May 13.—The chaplain of a certain American unit in the Lorraine sector has accounted for three Huns—by proxy.

When the unit entered the trenches, the chaplain addressed them as follows:

"Boys, international law says your chaplain can't shoot, but a war can't be won by not shooting. You all will have your guns notched for the Huns you've accounted for. I can have nothing to do with this. But after you get one for yourself, get one for me."

The three privates who conducted a successful daylight raid on the German trenches "got" six Germans between them. The raiders were John Dismukes of Nashville and Harry Couch and John McCain of Birmingham, Ala.

Three for Chaplain.

The three Southerners hunted up the chaplain today. The first one, showing his gunstock, said: "Chaplain, there's three—one for me and two for you."

The second showed his gunstock and said: "One is mine and one is yours."

The third had only one.

"Chaplain," he said, "as sure's I'm alive I'll get one for you."

The adventure, a meager account of which was received early today, was executed as follows:

Drop Four.

Dismukes, Couch and McCain, determined to get a German sniper from a stronghold where he had been endangering the Americans, made themselves

camouflaged suits and crossed No Man's Land.

Arriving at the stronghold they found an officer and several men. Their first shots dropped the officer and they got three more, the others running up a communication trench.

The three doughboys then retreated. Two of them, arriving in the American trenches, discovered that their comrade was missing. They organized a rescue party and found him. They are now the pride of the unit.

Dismukes, who stutters, was asked by a major if he had got enough.

"Fed up for today," "I'm fed up for today."

It was Dismukes who "got" three.

Another raiding party, composed of several officers and men, penetrating the German lines in a daylight sortie. They were exploring the positions when they found themselves surrounded by the boches.

The Americans cut loose and a free-for-all shooting match followed, the Yankees retreating as they fired.

One private dropped into a shell hole, emptying his automatic into the Germans and holding them off while his comrades reached safety.

Obtaining reinforcements, they re-engaged the Germans, who were now numerous. They executed their mission successfully, the Germans retiring. The Americans brought back the body of a German, together with a number of papers containing valuable military information.

JAMES GORDON BENNETT DIES IN FRANCE, AGE 77

NEW YORK, May 14.—James Gordon Bennett, proprietor of the New York Herald, died at his home, Villa Namouna, near Nice, France, this morning, according to a cablegram received here today.

He had been in ill health for some time.


Bennett was one of the best known figures in the newspaper world. He was born in New York May 10 1841, and was the son of James Gordon Bennett, Sr. Educated abroad by private tutors, he returned to the United States in 1866, and assumed control of the N. Y. Herald on the death of his father in 1872.

Altho residing in Paris, he since has actively controlled the Herald by cable. He published a Paris edition of the Herald and for some time a London edition.

At his own expense, Bennett sent Henry M. Stanley to Africa to find Livingstone, in 1874-77. He also fitted out the Jeanette polar expedition in 1879.

With John W. Mackay, he established the Commercial Cable Co. in 1883.

In 1886, Bennett won a yacht

acted laws which give the department much needed power.

"When all we could do to the noted spy Von Rintelen was to give him a brief jail sentence and fine for trying to have ships blown up, you can see the necessity of adequate new legislation. When I tell you that until the sabotage law was recently enacted, there was no adequate federal law for the punishment of arson, you can see how weak were the laws.

Almost every day some enemy alien who might do harm to our country quietly disappears and is taken to a detention camp. There are people who think such men are proved to be German spies. And they talk lightly about firing squads.

Do Preventive Work

"They forget that our courts are still functioning and that we are not under martial law, nor is this a time of invasion or rebellion.

"They forget also that these people we send to be interned have not been caught violating any laws. We aim to send them to internment camps before and not after they have done something wrong. If any enemy alien blows up a munition factory he would presumably be sentenced to death. But killing him would not make good the losses to our soldiers at the front by reason of that factory being destroyed. It is much better to intern the man who may commit mischief and thus safeguard the factory. Where there is no doubt as to an enemy alien we give Uncle Sam the benefit of the doubt.

"Also take the charge that we have frequently released enemy aliens after internment. There have been just six such cases.

"In one instance a dangerous enemy alien was released from custody because there was certain vital information which we hoped to get by paroling him for a few days, observing his actions and remarks. After this had been done he was re-interred for the duration of the war. He had been under close surveillance all the time and there was no chance

COUNT TO COMBAT INTERNMENT ORDER

CHICAGO, May 14.—Count James Minotto, son-in-law of Louis F. Swift, packer, was at liberty today. He is charged with being a dangerous alien.

The case will be heard in federal court here May 20 and it is expected to develop into a severe test of the president's alien enemy proclamation.

Questions at issue will be whether a habeas corpus writ may be issued after such an arrest and whether a court may assume jurisdiction on a presidential warrant. Great wealth and strong legal talent will be at Minotto's call. His bail bond of \$50,000 was readily furnished.
