Dempsey and Fred Sign Up

DENVER, Col., May 31.—Fred Fulton and Jack Dempsey, leaders in the heavyweight boxing division, have signed for a 20-round fight to a decision at Danbury, Conn., July 4. The amount of the purse has not been disclosed.

Fulton and Dempsey have agreed to turn 10 per cent of the proceeds of the fight over to war charities. Motion pictures of the bout also will be given over to the same purpose.

The fight will be promoted by J. R. Mulvihill of Danbury. It is understood Fulton will receive \$12,500 as his share.

Big Card Coming In Portland

(United Press Leased Wire.) PORTLAND, Ore., May 31.—The biggest card prepared for a Portland smoker in some years was tentatively announced today by the committee arranging for the Foundation company's smoker of June 12.

In addition to the main event a bout between Muff Bronson and Alex Trambitas, six rounds will be fought between George Ingle, Seattle, Pacific light-weight champion, and either Peter Mitchell of Portland or Joe Miller of San Francisco.

Joe Gorman, northwest feather-weight champion, will box six rounds with either Mike Pete, Seattle, or Claire Bromo, San Francisco.

Then there will be three four-round fights, showing Able Gordon against Billy Ryan, Sammy Gordon against Billy McCarthy, and Benny Levy against Kid Herman.
