### The elephants, the top balloons, the bands, the fresh roasted peanuts, the callioles, the clowns, the roaring beasts, the pink and spangled ladies, the sawdust scent and the great stretches of tents, all these and many other sights and sounds will be here tomorrow, for, with the morning comes the Sells-Floto circus.

At 11 a. m. the great street parade, with its bands and callioles, a parade that the circus men say has more of novelty and interest in each section than has been contained in the entire pageant of the big show before, will start thru downtown thoroughfares.

A mounted corps of pretty girl buglers will play martial music, while tableau wagons and allegorical cars will be distinguished by their loads of pretty girls, it is announced.

Of course, there will be the cages of wild beasts in which will sit women trainers, and the clowns, the cavaliers and ladies, the huge hippo and the herds of elephants and camels.

The performance will be given at 2:15 and 8:15 p. m.

The performances open with the spectacular extravaganza, "The Birth of the Rainbow," in which 600 people and 400 animals take part. In it walks Sunrise, recently purchased as the most beautiful horse in the world.

### Douglas Returns As Cub Mainstay

A couple of years ago when Fred Mitchell was appointed manager of the Cubs a lot of fans set up and yelled, "Who's this Mitchell, anyway?"

Then the story got around that Mitchell was the bird who made it possible for Stallings to put over a winner at Boston in 1914. The story gained a lot of credence at the time, but later Fred was rather discredited by the failure of his club to show much in the 1917 race. But this year Mitchell is showing what he can do.

Whether or not Mitchell was the man behind the Braves means little or nothing right now, but the fact that he is the force behind the Cubs means a great deal.

There has been no club in the National league hit harder by the draft than the Cubs.

When the season started Mitchell had a club that looked about one, two in the league. Then he lost Alexander, Douglas had been laid up with an operation and Killdorf went to the army making a big hole in his infield.

Did the Cubs fall down? Not that anyone could notice. Mitchell celebrated by passing the Giants and taking the league lead.

But the most striking incident in connection with the Cubs taking the lead was the fact that the game that displaced the Giants against the Phillies, Douglas had been out of the game all season and his first appearance was watched for with mingled hope and anxiety by Mitch.

Douglas' first game, one of three hits, presages his ability to carry his share of the pitching burdens of the Cubs this year which is welcome news in Chicago.
