## How to Celebrate

On July 28 come the semi-centennial of an important event in American history, the fiftieth anniversary of the fourteenth amendment to the constitution of the United States. Upon that day, 50 years ago, was written into the basic law of this land the principle that "all persons born or naturalized in the United States, and subject to the jurisdiction thereof, are citizens of the United States."

This extended to American citizens, regardless of color, equal civil rights.

Now it behooves us to celebrate that page in our national history. And there is no more fitting way than by stretching these "equal rights" to include ALL Americans, REGARDLESS OF SEX. We have had half century of equal civil rights for men only. Pass on to us that suffrage amendment, you hold-up senators, July 28 is near.

## Of Genuine Value

No man is better fitted than Maj. Gen. Hugh L. Scott to explain to the public the reason back of many little-understood requirements and customs in the army. This Gen. Scott will do in a number of articles written for and copyrighted by The Times and its associated papers in other cities.

No man in Uncle Sam's army has had a more diversified career than Gen. Scott, or has given more thought and study to the problems of keeping the men of the army human and democratic.

Scott has served thru every rank from that of second lieutenant to chief of staff.

From 1906 to 1910 he was superintendent and commandant of West Point.

After his retirement as chief of staff in 1917, due to his having reached the statutory retirement age of 64, Scott was recalled to active duty and was the chief military representative of the U. S. commission to Russia.

Later he went to France, where he assisted in getting the American expeditionary force on a fighting basis.

Falling to meet the physical requirements for continued active service in France, he returned and was placed in command of Camp Dix, New Jersey, where he is still on duty.

Fellow officers have remarked that Gen. Scott's outstanding characteristic is his regard for the man in the ranks.

He believes every man should meet scrupulously all military rules, but concedes the man's right to know WHY it is necessary.

It is WHY behind the fundamentals of army regulations that he will explain thru The Times to the people of Tacoma and the new draft men at Camp Lewis.

The sand is a good place to practice, as it gives a soft cushion to lie on.

Lie flat on the stomach, arms and legs stretched out as straight as possible. Raise both arms and legs at the same time and hold it.

Stretch. Move arms to side and back to position. Thrash legs up and down as in swimming.

This is another back-strengthening. All these exercises develop the muscles and the lung capacity, and all make for good swimming—and for beauty.
