Puyallup Boy Tells of Crops "Over There"

Here is a letter which Mrs. Mary E. Lindville, of Puyallup, received from her son, George T. Stone, who is with company C, 161st infantry:

"My Dear Mother:
"Your very welcome letter of April 30 came two days ago. Just as we were breaking camp, I didn't have time to read it until we were aboard the train. We are in a new camp now in an entirely different part of France and just oceans of work to be done.
"I was beginning to feel at home in our last place; however, we get along fine wherever we are. There is always lots of work and you know that keeps us all in the best of health and a fellow does not have time to get lonesome.
"France, mother, is a wonderful, beautiful country, this season of the year especially. The French soldiers are great fighters and they have done wonderfully against such a great power as Germany.
"The crops are looking fine, the vegetables are coming on in good shape. Women do a very big percentage of the work in the fields and shops. It looked very odd to me to see women and girls plowing and planting. They are cutting the first crop of hay now.
"Now, mother, do not think that your son George likes this country and people so well that he will stay here after the war is over. Oh, no. The old U. S. A. is good enough for me.
"Do not worry about me. Am getting along fine and in the best of health and expect to eat many more Christmas feasts with you.
"If you don't know what cooties are, well I do. We have some but can always get rid of them after we get settled in camp."
