HOME PRICES FOR FRUIT TREES

We have had occasion to warn our readers against buying trees of eastern agents. Their prices are higher and their stock so unsatisfactory by the time it arrives, even if it was in good condition when it was shipped (which may have been the case) that it is very strange that any man should need to be warned. Then, again, if it seems desirable to buy trees with fancy prices attached to them, why not give our local nurserymen the benefit of such a trade? The Rural Northwest tells of a case reported of a man living near Portland, and within a mile of two or three nurseries, who bought a number of Duchess of Oldenburg apple trees from an eastern nursery firm and paid 75 cents each for them, because the agent told him they were a new and rare variety which could not be obtained from any Oregon nurseryman. Another paid a dollar apiece for Idaho pear trees for this season's planting, and was afterwards astonished when he learned that he could have procured them of the local nurserymen for 15 cents each; and so it goes. In importing trees from the east it is well known, or should be well known, that there is great danger of spreading disease and insect pests, and surely we have a great plenty of these at the present time. A buyer who was posted would have made neither of the mistakes mentioned above, and we advise a man who is not posted to seek out an honest local nurseryman who is responsible, and take his advice and his statements, and then no mistakes will be made than can not be rectified on short notice, besides having the satisfaction of having spent your money at home, where you expect to sell your products. Let us assist each other and leave eastern tree agents to hunt elsewhere for suckers.

FARMERS ATTENTION.

There will be a farmers picnic on Shaw island on September 15. Possibly, if all arrangements can be perfected the gathering will convene Sept. 14th, and continue until the evening of the 15th. The general plan will be as follows:

The people of Shaw island will erect a platform and clear the ground around the school house, in the center of the island, at which all will gather. The platform will be for dancing, so the young people can dance all night. Friday night, if they so desire. Good music will be provided and everything arranged for a time of general enjoyment.

The citizens of Shaw island will have stoves on the ground for cooking purposes and arrangements will be made for those who wish to camp, so by taking a roll of blankets along, comfortable quarters can be fixed up. The good citizens of the island will furnish more comfortable quarters for those who do not wish to undertake the rigors of a night in camp.

All will bring hampers of provisions prepared for two days of jollity and genuine solid business for these days will not all be spent in sport. Good speakers will be provided to discuss the live issues of the day and farmers fruit growers and their wives, discuss all those questions pertaining to their various avocations, renew acquaintances and and form new ones, the young folks will have an opportunity to have their fill of grub. DEMOCRATIC STATE CONVENTION.

A General Convention of the Democratic Party of Washington is hereby called to meet in the City of North Yakima, Washington, on Wednesday September 26th, A. D., 1894, at 1 o'clock p. m. for the purpose of nominating candidates as follows, viz:—Two Members of Congress; two Judges of the Supreme Court; to constitute a new State Central Committee, and to transact such other necessary and proper business as may come before said Convention. The basis of representation by counties shall be as follows: Two delegates-at-large for each county and one delegate for each fraction thereof in excess of fifty, cast for the highest Presidential Elector at the General Election held November 8th, 1892, except in the County of King, which shall be entitled to forty-five delegates, including the delegates-at-large, and the County of Pierce, which shall be entitled to forty-four delegates including the delegates-at-large. San Juan county is entitled to four delegates. It is recommended by the State Central Committee that the primaries, for election of delegates be conducted under the primary election laws of this state. So as to insure the party against "Open" ward or precinct caucuses." It is also recommended that whenever two or more counties are associated together for legislative purposes, that the officers of the County Central Committees in such counties join in calling a convention to nominate candidates for such legislative officers.
