THE NEW DEPUTY COLLECTOR.

Saturday last George A. Ellsperman of Friday Harbor, Wash., the newly appointed deputy collector of the support of Blaice, accompanied by M. J. OUR FISHING INDUSTRY.

At the annual meeting of the stockholders of the Island Packing Company, held at the office of the cannery in this city, the following officers were re-elected for the ensuing year: John A. Devlin, president; Fred W. Keene, vice president; Phil S. Cook, secretary-treasurer; Ashton W. Thomas, trustee. Matters pertaining to the business and plant were discussed and among the improvements decided upon was the extension of the cannery wharf out into deep water, before the opening of next season's pack so that ocean steamers could enter at extreme low tide. This season's pack was, all things considered, very satisfactory to the company and the outlook for the future is encouraging to the projectors. The president and manager, John A. Devlin, has had long years experience in the business and finds a ready market for goods bearing his name. The packing season does not open until July but active operations will begin early in the spring, on the wharf extension, and, possibly, in enlarging the plant. WALDRON HERRING FISHERIES. In an interview with A. W. Thomas, of Thomas Bros. & Co., of Waldron, we learn that this season's pack of herring has been unusually large, and although coming late in the season has more than taxed the capacity of their extensive fishery. They have an established trade with parties in Victoria, and, besides supplying this market with fresh fish, they have packed some 21,000 boxes and pickled upwards of a hundred barrels. They contemplate enlarging the plant—just doubling its capacity,—in the spring. Graham Bros. and Capt. Edw. Graigie will also increase their facilities before next seasons pack. The fishing industry of the county is now well established and assuming proportions which will place it in the forefront, not only of this county but the entire Puget Sound country.

WEDDING BELLS ON LOPEZ.

Skelly, proprietor of the Central hotel at Castle Rock, has an unpaid board bill of \$60 as a memento of Henderson's stay there. Henderson to secure the cash is said to have hypotheicated notes given his company on policies he secured. He is short at a conservative estimate about \$400. He was working the territory about Castle Rock in the interests of the Massachusetts Life Insurance Company. He disappeared from there, leaving Lamont to borrow money with which to reach Seattle. On investigation it was learned that Henderson, accompanied by his wife and child, had departed for North Carolina. An attempt will be made to bring him back to Seattle on a requisition. The charge will be obtaining money under false pretenses, as the law says there can be no embezzlement where the party defendant has an interest in the money embezzled, and Henderson possessed that interest to the extent of one-half the commission on the policies.
