**WATER FRONT NOTES.**

The Thompson brought in ten tons of ice for the cannery last Thursday.

The Thompson took ten tons of hay from Richardson to Seattle, Tuesday.

Last evening the Utopia brought in 700 cases of rice for the Chinese mess house and 10,000 grain sacks for the Trading Co.

The Bay City which is now on the Island route has had a very fair freight business and a good passenger list for the past week.

The Buckeye run around to Cowell's lime works on last Thursday to get the wreck of the scowmer industry and tow it around to the mill at Newall.

Last week the Utopia discharged about 35 tons of general merchandise for the Trading Co., and about five tons of freight and 1,700 boxes for the Island Packing Co.

The fishing schooner Colby, of Anacortes, returned from Alaska, Saturday where she had been cod fishing. She had 21,000 fine cod aboard, which filled her to overflowing.

The mail steamer Thompson broke her wheel on Wednesday morning of last week, when about three miles out of Seattle, and they had to run back and put her on the dry dock for temporary repairs. She ran last Sunday to make up her lost time and on next Sunday will again be p. m. on the dry dock and receive a new speed wheel.

The schooner industry, the property of Mr. J. C. Newall, was quite badly wrecked in the Straits of Pea, at Cowell's lime works, on Tuesday of last week. She was discharging lumber on the dock when the heavy wind storm came up from the southwest and she was blown nearly to pieces against the wharf and rocks. Her house was all torn away and nearly all the seams in her hull opened and the corking washed out. Mr. Newall says all her timbers are in good shape however and that she will be repaired at once which will cost about \$200.

**Cascade Lake Hotel Destroyed By Fire.**

About 8 o'clock last Friday morning, one of the girls working at the Cascade Lake Hotel stepped to the door and smelling smoke looked up and discovered the roof all ablaze and nearly ready to fall in. No cause can be assigned other than the explosion of a lamp which had been left burning in one of the upper floor rooms by some young ladies who had been curling their hair preparatory to going to the picnic on Shaw Island. Mrs. L. E. Cox, the owner of the hotel was absent at the time and nothing was saved excepting two sacks of flour, one or two trunks and a few clothes. The building was partially insured but the amount carried we have been unable as yet to ascertain. It is charmingly located, most cozy and homelike in its appointments, admirably managed and altogether one of the pleasantest and most picturesque places of public resort in the state. Mrs. Cox deserves much credit for her enterprise and much sympathy in her misfortune. It is to be hoped that she will rebuild. Since she purchased the property business conditions have not been such as to make the venture as profitable as it would be in better times, but the better times are coming and there will be more and more people every year who will seek rest and recreation among our lovely islands, and they will go into ecstasies over such romantic and homelike hostleries as Mrs. Cox had at Cascade lake.

**Mother and Child Drowned.**

One of the saddest accidents in the history of this county occurred on Tuesday of last week at the home of John Carle, near Port Stanley, on Lopez Island. His little boy, who was about three years old fell in a well that had been left uncovered for a short time and the grief-stricken mother in trying to rescue the little one out was herself drowned. While Mrs. Carle's mother was gone to Port Stanley for help she secured a rope and tying one end to the limb of a tree which hung over the well, and the other end to her waist, she jumped in, the rope broke and she went to the bottom. The well is about fifty feet deep and has some thirty feet of water in it. When her body was taken out it was found that her neck was broken and her waist nearly cut in two by the rope. Mrs. Carle was 30 years of age, highly respected by all her neighbors and was a kind wife and loving mother. She leaves a husband, five small children and her mother to mourn the loss. She and her little one were buried at Port Stanley on Thursday afternoon. The family have the deepest sympathy of the entire community.

**The New Dryer at Orcas.**

The new building now being erected for the Orcas Fruit Dryer Co., at Orcas, will be completed by the middle of next week, ready to receive the new machinery which will arrive about the first of September. The building is of a very substantial structure, 30 x 60 feet and two stories high with a wing on one end 20 x 30 feet, to be used for the engine and boiler room. The lower floor of the main building will be used for drier, grader, etc. and the upper floor for the pecking and storage room. The J. M.
