An eastern paper asks the question "Are there too many preachers?" Quite likely there are, but it is a pretty sure thing that there are not too many good ones.

PRESTO, change! Silverites go to the Klondyke, strike it rich and come out gold bugs, or at least opposed to fiat money or free silver. Let the good work go on.

If the Populists had succeeded in "repealing the law of supply and demand," as one enthusiastic Bryanite over in Whatcom county said last fall that they would do if they "got in," it would be interesting to know what would be the relative values of wheat and silver now.

A NEW Klondyke is reported in the rugged mountains of Whatcom county between hoary headed old Mount Baker and the international boundary, where it is claimed that a vein of very rich free milling gold quartz has been discovered, two to three feet in width. It is to be hoped that the good reports which have come down from there may be verified by later developments.

A RECENTLY published list of post-office recommendations made by Senator Wilson includes the name of Mr. S. H. Stowers for the postmastership at East Sound. It would be impossible to make a better selection among the scores of good Republicans in that charming place. The office having been held by Democrats ever since its establishment more than twenty years ago, it is no more than a "fair deal" that a good Republican should have a turn at it for a while, especially as East Sound politically is overwhelmingly Republican.

WHEN the price of wheat began to rise shortly before the last presidential election it was gravely alleged by the silverites that Mark Hanna and his associate conspirators against the welfare of the "masses" had cornered the market for diabolical political purposes. Wheat has reached the dollar mark and bids fair to go still higher, but although Mark Hanna is still much advertised in the silver papers, nothing is heard nowadays about his wheat corner. It would take many men of many millions to raise the market to the dollar point and keep it there indefinitely—so many that the most radical Populists must now be ready to admit the absurdity of the proposition.

THE ISLANDER sincerely regrets that Rev. Wm. Dickson, of East Sound, is soon to remove from the county, the church in which he is such an active, earnest and efficient worker, having decided to transfer him to what is deemed a wider field of usefulness, with headquarters at Anacortes. The county can ill afford to lose from its citizenship such men as Mr. Dickson. He is a thorough Christian gentleman, whose zeal and energy in every good work, liberality, broad charity and kindly offices in quiet unobtrusive ways, have endeared him, not only to the members of the congregations that have followed him and helped him in his ministerial work in this county, but also to the hearts of many people who are not communicants of his church or any other. He and his estimable family will be going for good wherever they may go.

COMMENTING on the value of political life the Boston Herald very pertinently says: "The opinion evidently prevails among a very large class of our wealthy and cultivated people that to go into public life is to descend to duties unworthy of them. They judge the men who occupy such positions with insulting severity, classing them in their minds as useless and self-seeking, than which nothing can be more childish or more imbecile. Any observer who has lived a little in the different grades of society will quickly renounce the puerile idea that refined and intellectual pursuits are the only ones worthy of a gentleman's attention. This very political life, which appears unworthy of their attention to so many men, is in reality the great field where the nations of the world fight out their differences; where the seed is sown that will later ripen into vast crops of truth and justice. It is, if rightly regarded and honestly followed, the battle ground where man's highest qualities are put to their noblest use—that of working for the happiness of others."

but it will doubtless be near the route of the old military cable laid by the British government and taken up years ago, after the final settlement of the boundary controversy and the completion of the Canadian trans-continental telegraph line across the Northwest Territory and British Columbia. THE ISLANDER has several times called attention to the great benefit that telegraph communication would be to this county, and has advised that some concerted and persistent effort be made to bring it about. The opportunity now offered ought not to be lost. Strong efforts should be made by the business men, especially of the county seat, to have an office established and maintained here, and there should also be one at Roche Harbor for the convenience of the business interest and government service there. The county would then be "in touch," daily and hourly, with the great world at large and one of the most serious disadvantages under which the county now labors would be removed.
