GENERAL NEWS NOTES,

The wire rail trust has advanced the  
price 5 to 19 cents per keg.  
A special to the New York Tribune  
from Havana, dated March 4, says:  
The wrecking companies will be able to  
raise the guns of the Maine. The hull  
is not an asset of any value to the gov-  
ernment. The wreck promises to re-  
main in the harbor for an indefinite  
period.

Spain has demanded Lee's recall and  
the stoppage of the sending of relief to  
starving Cuban non-combatants in  
United States warships. The president  
has given out a statement that he per-  
sonally declines to consider either  
proposition. It remains for Spain to  
use force if she persists.

A Vancouver, B. C., dispatch dated  
March 7 says: Capt. Charles Cates re-  
turned from Skagway today with the  
official map of the Yukon and Skagway;  
also of the Yukon district, showing  
Rosedale creek which is proving the  
richest creek in Klondike, much richer  
than Bonanza, Eldorado or Hunker.

The navy department is making pre-  
parations to replenish the supply of am-  
munition of the United States warships  
in the Asiatic station. To this end or-  
ders have been sent to the training ship  
Mohican, now at Mare Island, to carry  
ammunition. The ship will be ordered  
to leave for a long cruise with naval ap-  
proaches. She will carry 30 tons of am-  
munition for the China fleet and will  
start almost immediately.

A Washington City dispatch dated  
March 7 says: Spain has withdrawn  
the request for the recall of Consul-  
General Lee. It is believed the in-  
cident is practically closed. The with-  
drawal came today in the shape of an  
official communication from Minister  
Woodford. It is stated the request was  
never put in the shape of a demand, but  
was merely a suggestion on the part of  
Spain, and when she found it would  
not be pleasantly received by this coun-  
try she promptly recalled it.

On Friday, March 4, after a debate  
lasting several days, the senate passed  
the bill extending the homestead laws  
and providing the right way for rail-  
roads in the district of Alaska. Section  
6 providing for certain bonding con-  
cessions to Canada in lieu of privileges  
to be extended by the Dominion gov-  
ernment to this country, induced a liv-  
ely debate, as it brought into the con-  
troversy the old fisheries question on  
New England coast, which has been  
pending between the United States and  
Great Britain for a hundred years. The  
statement was made on the floor  
of the senate that there was ever  
reason to believe that by the passage of  
the bill the fisheries question could be  
settled without great effort, as assur-  
ances to that effect had been received  
from a large and influential element in  
Canada.

The Oakes-Armstrong Road Dispute.  
EDITOR ISLANDER.—Dear Sir:—  
The following is a true copy of the  
petition presented to the board of coun-  
ty commissioners of San Juan county,  
praying for the establishment of the  
county road on this island which has  
been the cause of so much dispute and  
no small amount of hard feeling. The  
petition was acted upon by said board  
and the road ordered established. It  
reads as follows:  
To the Honorable Board of County  
Commissioners, of San Juan County,  
Washington Territory:  
We, the undersigned, settlers of San  
Juan Island, hereby respectfully peti-  
tion the honorable board of county  
commissioners of San Juan county, for  
a county road starting at the new  
county road between the R. H. Frazer  
and George Smith places and running  
along to the old road and the front  
of the school house of District No. 1, to  
the turn on Portland Fair hill; thence  
to a stake back of the S. V. Boyce  
dwelling house; thence along the gravel  
ridge to a stake on the line between the  
S. V. Boyce and P. Bigan places, and  
running west through Bigan's field  
and crossing the creek one hundred  
yards above the bridge; thence running  
on the west line between the Ross and  
Baller places and through the James  
M. Fleming field and along the line be-  
tween the Ferrel place and the Thos.  
Fleming homestead claim; thence tak-  
ing the most practicable route to the  
McCurdy lime kiln.  
Your humble petitioners are so deeply  
impressed of the importance and bene-  
fit to the whole island of the above de-  
scribed road, that we, the owners of the  
land through which the above described  
road would pass, hereby declare our  
willingness to give forty (40) feet in  
width of land, for said road, without  
any compensation from the county.  
We further ask that so soon as the  
above road will be opened that the old  
road from Portland Fair hill to Han-  
nan place will be closed and your pe-  
titioners will ever pray.
