WAR NOTES.
 Two British ships sailed from Philadelphia on the 25th inst. with nearly 6,000 tons of coal for Admiral Dewey's fleet at Manila.
 It is announced that another army of 16,000 men is to be sent to re-inforce the present army under Gen. Shafter, now advancing against Santiago.
 Marshal Campos, formerly governor-general of Cuba, is quoted as saying that "a majority of the nation is eager for peace, and averse to any revolution or civil war."
 The Spanish are said to have a force of 12,000 regulars at Santiago, 10,000 at Holguin and 15,000 at Manzanillo. The insurgents are expected to keep the Holguin and Manzanillo forces from reaching Santiago.
 What's the matter with the Hawaiians? They are all right. The day annexation is announced they will have a regiment all ready for service at Manila if they are needed.
 The decision of the administration to "carry the war into Africa" by sending a naval force into Spanish waters will be received with satisfaction. It is said that this course has been decided on in case Camara's fleet has really and truly sailed for Manila. However, that should make no difference. We have plenty of ships with which to sink Camara's fleet, and it would prove perfectly satisfactory to the people if it should be met and whipped, instead of leaving it to be dealt with by Dewey.
 A leading Madrid paper publishes a report to the effect that the peace conditions suggested by the government of the United States include:
 "The possession by the United States of the island of Porto Rico.
 "The independence of the island of Cuba under a protectorate of the United States.
 "The establishment of a naval station for United States warships in the Philippines.
 "The establishment of a coal depot for United States warships in the Canary Islands.
 A fight took place on the 24th inst. between a Spanish force estimated at 2,000 men and 1,000 U. S. cavalry within a few miles of Santiago. The Spaniards were driven into the city with considerable loss, while the American force suffered a loss of thirteen killed and quite a number wounded. The regulars were in command of Gen. Young and the "Rough Riders" were in the fight at another place under command of Col. Wood and Lieut.-Col. Roosevelt. Sergeant Hamilton Fish, who was secretary of state in the cabinet of President Grant, was among the killed, as was also Capt. Allen W. Capron of troop L, of the "Rough Riders," Major Brodie, the noted Indian fighter, was wounded.
 The victims of our first skirmish of any account on Cuban soil show the cosmopolitan character of the men who are fighting for their country. Regulars and volunteers were alike engaged and side by side fell sons of millionaires and cowboys from the plains, college men and workmen drawn from every section of this great nation. All showed equal bravery and the glory of it is that none faltered nor held back from duty in the face of death. At no point have American pluck and daring been found lacking from the time Dewey started into Manila's torpedoes harbor or Hobson took his forlorn hope into Santiago. The Yankee lads have been ready and anxious on every occasion to be chosen for deeds of daring and glory.
