### THE WINNING TICKET

Republicans Hold an Exceptionally Harmonious Convention.

THE FULL LIST OF NOMINATIONS.

Old Officers Who Were Candidates and Eligible Renominated—Delegates to State and Joint Senatorial Conventions.

The Republican county convention was called to order at 2 p. m. yesterday by J. A. Gould, in the absence of C. H. Stowers, chairman of the central committee. On motion S. H. Stowers, of East Sound, John S. McMillin, of Roche Harbor, was made temporary chairman and on taking the platform made an enthusiastic address, speaking from behind a table covered with the American flag and with a fine picture of President McKinley at his right. At the conclusion of his address George Gibbs, of Orcas, was chosen temporary secretary. On motion of F. H. Gray, of Orcas, three committees were appointed as follows:

Credentials—C. M. Bartlett, C. E. Cantline, Zeno Gilliland.

Permanent organization and order of business—F. H. Gray, Benj. Hayden, John G. Viereck.

Platform and resolutions—S. H. Stowers, Wm. Graham, Wm. Shultz.

After the committees had retired to prepare their reports W. J. Court, of East Sound, was called upon for a song and he gave the convention a lively one of his own composition, which he called "About the War" and said was "sentimental." Following this he sang "The Red, White and Blue" the convention joining heartily in the chorus.

A recess was then taken until the committees were ready to report.

The committee on credentials reported delegates entitled to seats as follows:

The publication of the platform reported by the committee and adopted is necessarily deferred until next week. The following special resolution was adopted to provide for possible contingencies:

"That the Republican central committee be and is hereby authorized and empowered to fill any and all vacancies which may occur in the nominations for the respective offices, upon the ticket nominated by this convention."

The temporary organization was made permanent.
