NATIONAL WEALTH.

"According to all present indications the Federal census of 1900 will be a record-breaking one," says the American Economist. "If the present rate of increase is maintained it will show a total accumulated wealth not far from \$110,000,000,000, or nearly 70 per cent more than the amount shown by the census of 1890. By the Federal census of 1890 the aggregate material wealth of the United States, compared with the wealth of Great Britain, was less in ships and merchandise, but exceeded in many other items. The real estate of this country was then valued at \$39,000,000,000, the live stock at \$2,000,000,000, the railroads at \$8,000,000,000, manufactures and their contents at \$3,000,000,000, mines and quarries at \$1,200,000,000. In 1890 the wealth of the United States was estimated at \$20,000,000,000; in 1870 at \$25,000,000,000; in 1850 at \$45,000,000,000, and in 1830 at \$65,000,000,000."

According to the estimate of Muthall, published in 1892, the wealth of nations was as follows for the chief countries, for lands, farm utensils, bullion, cattle, houses, furniture, railroads, shipping, merchandise and sundries:

On an estimated basis of \$110,000,000,000 as the total wealth and of 75,000,000 as the population in 1900, the average wealth per capita in the United States will show an increase of from \$1,050 in 1890 to \$1,406 in 1900, or considerably greater than that of any other nation. Heretofore the United States has ranked fifth among the nations in wealth per capita, the figures being \$1,200 for the United Kingdom, \$1,150 for Denmark, \$1,120 for France, \$1,080 for Holland, and \$1,050 for the United States.

The increase of \$45,000,000,000 in the total wealth of the United States in the decade closing with 1900 is unparalleled in the history of nations. It represents a larger sum than the aggregate wealth of any other country ten years ago, with the single exception of the United Kingdom, while the total of \$110,000,000,000 will be nearly double that of the next wealthiest country. The Federal census takes account of statistics by decades only. If the Federal census could show the correct figures for intervening years—for example, the aggregate national wealth for 1895, under the fearful depression of values following the enactment of the Wilson-Gorman Free-Trade Tariff of 1894—the contrast would be a startling one. Equally startling would be the contrast between the national wealth per capita in 1892, when Protection and Prosperity went hand in hand, and that of 1895, when Free-Trade had begun its deadly work.

Unfortunately, these contrasts cannot be shown, and the countless billions of shrinkage in material wealth growing out of a ruinous economic policy can scarcely be approximated, much less accurately estimated. It is enough that the American people know in a general way the tremendous difference between then and now; that they perfectly understand what made the country poor and what has assisted to bring about the \$45,000,000,000 of increase in national wealth in ten years to the present stupendous total of \$110,000,000,000.

COBDEBITS ALARMED.

The Indian bill proposed by the British government puts countervailing duties on bounty-fed sugar, and the secretary of state of India, Lord George Hamilton, has frankly declared that the object of the bill is to prevent the indigenous trade of India from being undermined by subsidized foreign products. The Cobdebits are greatly aroused at this provision and express the fear that it is the thin edge of the Protection wedge and that it may eventually be applied to Great Britain. The "Daily Chronicle" says:

"There is a strong impression that this Indian duty is intended as a feint to an English duty, and the whole Free-Trade position is imperiled."

Henry Labouchere, in "Truth," says:

"The government is going to try an Indian reactionary Protectionist policy, which it would not dare introduce at home. The bill may be the first step toward a general system of protection."

There has been for some time a growing feeling in England in favor of protection. It would not be strange if considerable impetus had been given to this feeling by the existing trade conditions in the United Kingdom. With a tremendous balance of trade against her every year, with the great Protectionist country of the world crowding her out of the world's markets and every year rolling up a re-

menable favorable trade balance, it would be strange indeed if British statesmen did not give some serious consideration to the question of the advisability of the adoption of a protection policy. Cobden prophesied that inside of fifty years free-trade would triumph in all the leading countries of the world. The fifty years is barely up, and the century is closing with the policy of protection stronger than ever before, and with signs that indicate that Cobden's own country, which has stood for fifty years as the nation of free-trade, may, within another decade, abandon free-trade and adopt protection in order to save herself from falling too far behind in the commercial race.
