PRESIDENT'S PHILIPPINE POLICY.

In two speeches made recently, one at Ocean Grove, N. J., before the Methodist camp meeting, and the other at Pittsburg, in welcoming the Tenth Pennsylvania volunteers back from Manila, President McKinley laid down, in terms more definite than any used by him before, the administration's policy in the Philippines. At Ocean Grove he declared this policy to be: "Peace first, then, with charity for all, establish a government of law and order, protecting life property, and occupation, for the well-being of the people, a government in which they shall participate under the stars and stripes."

To the Pennsylvania regiment, and through it, to the nation at large, he recounted the war in the Philippines, how the treachery and duplicity of the insurgents; how pending the ratification of the treaty of peace with Spain, orders from Washington forbade any act on the part of the army at Manila that might provoke hostilities.

"The first blow was struck by the insurgents. Our kindness was reciprocated with cruelty, our mercy with a Mauser. The flag of truce was invoked only to be dishonored. Our soldiers were shot down when ministering to the wounded Filipinos. Our humanity was interpreted as weakness, our forbearance as cowardice. They assailed our sovereignty, and there will be no useless parley—no pause until the insurrection is suppressed and American authority acknowledged and established."

Our rights and status in the Philippines he defined in these words:

"Peace brought us the Philippines, by treaty cession from Spain. The senate of the United States ratified the treaty. Every step taken was in obedience to the requirements of the Constitution. It became our territory and is ours, as much as the Louisiana purchase, or Texas, or Alaska. A body of insurgents, in no sense representing the sentiments of the people of the islands, disputed our lawful authority, and even sought the ratification of the treaty by the American senate, were attacking the very forces who fought for and secured their freedom."

The order excluding sheep from the Rainier forest reserve went into effect last Monday. Nearly or quite one-quarter of a million sheep, or approximately one-half the entire number in the state according to the assessment returns of last year, have been pastured on the reserve this season. If the exclusion order is enforced next year, as it now seems likely that it will be, it will seriously effect the sheep raising industry in the state, as there are no other large ranges to which the sheep can be driven for summer pasturage. The sheep men will make a strong effort to secure congressional action this winter allowing them to pasture their flocks upon the reserve under proper restrictions, and if they fail they say they will either sell out in the spring or take their flocks to Idaho or Montana. Last year the value of sheep in this county as equalized by the state board, was \$5,615. This year, according to the county assessor's returns, the value is \$15,963. There has not, however, been any such an increase in the sheep industry in this county as these figures would seem to indicate, as the county assessor's valuation per head is greater than the valuation fixed by the state board of equalization for the levy of state taxes. The total number of sheep in the county last year, according to the assessment returns, was 5,306. This year the number reported for assessment is 5,555. Figuring the wool clip on the government basis of 6.30 pounds to the fleece the total clip would be 84,906 pounds, and the value at the present average price of fifteen cents a pound would be \$5,249. The conditions for profitable sheep raising in this county are so favorable that the industry is practically certain to increase largely within the next few years.

It must greatly grieve a patriotic Democrat of the old school, loyal to the best traditions of the party and the principles of its patriot founders, to witness the party's pitiable gyrations now in the arena of politics and see to what depths it has descended when it accepts the leadership of such men as Altgeld and Tillman and Lentz and Warner and applauds the eulogistic references to Aguinaldo as "one of the heroes of the world." These men grievously mistake the temper of the American people if they imagine that their commendation of the cruel and treacherous young adventurer of the Philippines, whose insatiable ambition is responsible for the deaths of so many brave young Americans in those distant islands, will strike a popular chord in the United States and waft into power at Washington the party that supports such treasonable drive. The free silver Democrats are hard pressed for campaign material when they descend to apotheosizing the leader of an armed rebellion against the authority of the United States in its own possessions, and condemn the lofty purposes of the government to establish peace, progress and prosperity in the place of war, anarchy and persecution in the Philippines.

In Dr. H. K. Carroll's summary of religious statistics for 1898 in the New York Christian Advocate he shows that in the United States there were in 1890 111,036 ministers, 159,946 churches, and 23,618,969 communicants. In 1898 there were 143,320 ministers, 187,100 churches, and 26,657,969 communicants. In Dr. Carroll's compilation 148 denominations are represented. But he says: "There are only twenty-nine which have 100,000 or more communicants each, while twenty-six have less than 1,000 each. Not a few are in process of decay, and will soon disappear."
