OBITUARY

Never have the people of this community been so shocked and grieved as they were on Friday morning of last week by the death of Miss Louise Hastings, who had been attending high school in Bellingham and was spending the holidays at her home here. On Friday morning she arose in apparently perfect health and passed a few pleasant remarks with members of the family, after which she complained of a pain in her head, which rapidly grew worse and at the end of an hour she had passed away. After a thorough examination by Dr. Fitz-Matthew, of West Sound, and Dr. A. Macrae Smith, of Bellingham, it was decided that the cause of her death was hemorrhage of the brain.

EDITH LOUINE HASTINGS was born in Lemond, Minnesota, May 23, 1887, and died in East Sound, Washington, December 29, 1905. Her mother died when Louise was ten days old and she was taken by her aunt, Mrs. S. H. Stowers, of Owatonna, Minnesota, who cared for her as her own, and who, at her death, some five years later, left to her daughters, Misses Mary and Nettie Stowers, the care of the little one who had become so dear to them all, and well indeed has that duty been performed. In the summer of 1893 the family removed to East Sound, where they have since resided, and where Louise grew up, endeavoring herself to her school mates, teachers, and to the whole community.

She leaves to mourn her loss her cousins, Miss Mary Stowers, Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Bechaud, Mr. and Mrs. Walter Stowers and her father and step-mother, Mr. and Mrs. M. R. Hastings, two brothers, a half brother and sister of Owatonna, Minn., Mr. and Mrs. Dunbar, Benedji, Minn., Mrs. Stoughton, Wickersham, Wash., and Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Stowers. The funeral took place from the M. E. church Jan. 1st, 1906. Rev. S. V. Warren conducted the services.
