E. C. Rowley plead guilty in the Superior Court Wednesday to the charge of assault upon Jas. Kennedy, committed at Deer Harbor, Aug. 24, and Judge Joiner imposed a fine of \$750 and costs amounting to \$50.45, which he paid and was discharged. He had previously settled with Kennedy by paying him \$1000.


