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## The late Rev. W. I. Dickson

The Chehalis Bee-Nugget contains the following biographical sketch of the late Rev. Wm. J. Dickson, who was for a number of years engaged in religious work in this county:

"William John Dickson was born April 15, 1840 in London, England."

He removed with his parents to Toronto, Canada, in 1842. His father was in the elevator and grain business. About 1847 the family removed to Albany, N. Y., where he lived until 1889. For three years during that time he lived in Syracuse, N. Y. While living there he enlisted in the Second New York Haines light cavalry, Company G, and served through the last nine months of the Civil war. He was married in 1868 to Miss Marie J. Gurnett. He removed to Seattle, Wash., in 1889 and engaged in business there. He was ordained deacon by Bishop Paddock in 1892 and took charge of church at Mt. Vernon, and missionary charge of Skagit county. He was ordained to the priesthood in 1895 by Bishop Barker and was a missionary on Orcas island for four years and in charge of Christ church at Anacortes one year. Mr. Dickson was called to Epiphany church, Chehalis, from Anacortes, serving Chehalis three years, then went to St. Andrews, Tacoma, and was recalled to Chehalis in 1904, where he served until his death. Three children were born; one, a son, died in infancy, the second, a daughter, died in childhood. Ruth G. Dickson the third child, is with her widowed mother. Under the rectorship of Mr. Dickson his spirit of Christian fellowship has cemented the little parish of the Epiphany into one large family, where discord has not been permitted to enter. The mutual affection that had grown up between the parishioners and their beloved pastor is the finest tribute to the saintly character of this soldier of Christ. He was however, admired, esteemed and respected by people of all denominations who knew him and by those who were not members of any religious faith.

Melvin Nichols, five year old son of Mrs. Millie Nichols, met with quite a serious accident last Saturday. He fell from a saw horse and sustained what Dr. Capron, with his x-ray machine, discovered to be a transverse fracture of the lower end of the humerus, the fracture running down into the elbow joint. The bones will unite but the doctor says the arm is almost certain to be stiff.

Louis Scribner, for a long time engineer on the City of Anacortes, is now employed as engineer of the mission power boat Columbia, of Vancouver, B. C., operated under the direction of a minister of the Episcopal church. She carries a hospital equipment and cruises along the coast of British Columbia, including the islands of the province.

A San Francisco paper says that Misses Isabelle and Helen E. Cowell, sisters of the late E. V. Cowell, were traveling in Europe at the time of their brother's death and could not be located up to the time of the funeral. They were believed to be at some secluded watering place. Mr. Cowell died of spinal meningitis after an illness of only five days.
