Harold's good times and "having fun" days are over, and he will no doubt wish many times before he has liberty again that he had made an effort to do the right thing and respected the rights of others. Boys of his age can exert an influence for good on their companions, not by being "goody-goody," but by being straightforward and manly. Harold was not necessarily worse than some other Friday Harbor lads, but more reckless than most. Others are being more closely watched than heretofore, and it behooves them to try and gain the respect of the people by refusing to do anything but the right thing. Otherwise the proper officials will consider it necessary to curb them and "put them out of circulation" for the sake of their schoolmates.
