Joe Martin, of Friday Harbor won the rowing race over Claire Trift, of Shaw Island.


The flag at the end of the greasy pole was secured by Louis Murray, with Alfred Coffelt and Harry Egeland as contestants.

Glorious Fourth

The celebration at Friday Harbor on the Fourth is said to have been the most satisfactory and enjoyable in its history, and those fortunate enough to be here may have pleasant recollections in their minds on future occasions. The weather was perfect for carrying out a splendid program without discomfort—cloudy most of the day, with a temperature just right. Not a hitch or jar occurred during all the day to mar its pleasures.

The crowd went early to the ball grounds to witness the various contests, and at noon repaired to the school house grove for the barbecue, where the meats, bread, coffee, milk, etc. were ready for the hungry hundreds. The program committee is to be congratulated on the success of this feature.

Soon after lunch the ball game between Gerard's tigers and the West Sound team was called. To many this was the event of the day, because of the spirit of rivalry which has existed from former games between Friday Harbor and West Sound. Last year the latter team was victorious, and it was felt that the result would be different this time, (notwithstanding it was understood that the visitors were securing the best outside talent available) because the Tigers with their regular line-up were unbeatable by any aggregation not in constant practice. From the beginning it was apparent that West Sound was doomed to defeat.
