PROHIBITION OR LICENSE, WHICH?

In the series of letters giving reasons for and against prohibition of the manufacture and sale of intoxicating liquors, which are being published by the Seattle Star, you will notice that the reason or argument most frequently given against prohibition is that the liquor traffic is such an inveterate law-breaker that you can not control it. "Prohibition can not prohibit," is the cry of the liquor dealer and his friends; then they cite the numberless instances of illegal selling of liquor, to prove that it cannot be controlled by law. It seems to us that this, in itself, is a strong argument in favor of prohibition. If we have in our midst an outlaw, who defies the government of our state and country (and we surely have) is it not high time for the people to rise in their might and say to this interloper, "You shall not continue to rule our country, dominating our politics, debauching our young men, taking our husbands and fathers and transforming them into covering slaves who would pawn the children's shoes for another drink of the liquid damnation."
