Additional Local News

Mr. and Mrs. L. J. Bowler left Saturday morning for Cheney, where Mr. Bowler will attend the summer session of the State Normal school, taking a course in school supervision with special reference to the work which he will have to do as superintendent of the Ferndale schools.

Prof. Frye, who will be the director of the Puget Sound marine station here this summer, arrived Monday morning with two assistants to get the station in readiness for the season's work. He has contracted with A. J. Paxson to supply the station with water this year. A two-inch pipe will be laid from the station buildings to the town limits, at the expense of the university, with a view to connecting with the city water system as soon as possible.

State Fish Commissioner Darwin and Prof. Smith, of the state university, made a brief call here last Sunday, coming on the fine new fish commission boat "Gov. Elisha P. Ferry," designed and built for the use of the fish commissioner and his deputies in enforcing the fisheries laws. The vessel is sixty-five feet in length and is very staunchly constructed and nicely finished. The object of the commissioners trip last Sunday was to leave at the Friday Harbor Packing Co.'s cannery here one of a number of galvanized tanks especially made for the preservation in a solution of formaldehyde of rare specimens of fishes caught in traps or seines, which specimens are to form a part of the state fisheries exhibit at the Panama-Pacific exposition. Prof. Smith, who is Prof. Kincaid's chief assistant in the department of zoology, is assisting Commissioner Darwin in preparing the exhibit. He will be one of the instructors at the Puget Sound marine station her this summer.
