The Stevens County Meat Market is making improvements in Colville and Chewelah that are a credit to a growing county. A refrigerating plant is being installed in the company's market in each town that will have a capacity of 100 head of stock. The refrigerators will each be 40 feet long, 12 feet high and 10 feet wide. An ice manufacturing machine will furnish ice for their own use but none will be made for sale. This will be the first refrigerating plant to be placed in the county.
