Bonner, city engineer, \$100; A. B. Sansburn, clerk, \$40; J. S. Wright, chief of police, \$70; J. M. Williams, superintendent water system, \$70. Ordinance No. 123 relating to theater licenses passed second reading and placed on final passage. Report of W. L. Terry showed \$428 collected from water users for month of November. Communication of Supt. Williams regarding water rates read and approved. Report of Chief Wright showed five arrests for November and \$11.50 fines collected. Ordinance No. 124 confirming assessment roll of Janet street introduced and passed first reading. This provides that half the assessments shall be delinquent Jan. 1, the balance April 1, delinquent assessments to bear 15 per cent interest.
