The Colville high school will soon hold its declamatory contest to select four representatives for the district contest to be held at Kettle Falls March 28. The winner at Kettle Falls will represent the Colville district at the annual meet here in May.

The eighth grade of the public school is preparing to give a play for the benefit of the piano fund. The high school athletic association is also making preparations to present "The Comrades," the proceeds to go to securing paraphernalia and paying hall rent for the association.

A number of Colville music lovers will attend the reproduction of Wagner's "Parsifal" at the Spokane theatre March 8 and 9. The scenery is said to be on a lavish scale and the illuminations and electrical effects are made a feature. An augmented orchestra of 20 pieces will render the music. The time for the curtain to rise will differ from that of the former custom, the long dinner intermission having been eliminated, permitting of giving the play at one sitting. The curtain goes up promptly at 7:45 o'clock.

Andrew Arnold, a French Canadian, who was working at the Davis sawmill in the Basin, while loading logs Wednesday morning was caught by a falling tree and killed.
